COMMERCIAL.

Weekly Review of Montreal Wholesale Markets.

Business on the whole last week has been moderate. In some lines a great improvement has been noticed, and remittances are coming in fairly well.

FLLOUR, GRAIN &c.

FLLOUR.—The tone of the market continues to rule firm under a good volume of trade, both for local and export account. The city and country trade has also shown signs of improvement.

WHEAT.—The market still wears a firm complexion, although there is probably less activity in the grain and flour markets.

RYE.—There is a good inquiry for rye for the local trade for shipment to the West and export demand.

BARLEY.—The market continues firm with latest sales at 68c to 69c per bushel.

CORN.—Prices continue more or less nominal at 47c to 48c per bushel.

PROVISIONS, &c.—During the past week there has been a fairly active business at lower prices, sales of round lots of Montreal short cut mess pork having been made at \$17.

COUNTRY PRODUCE.—A considerable quantity of eggs have come into packers' hands at 12c.

DAIRY PRODUCE.—BUTTER.—The market is devoid of the slightest traces of life.

FRUITS, &c.—APPLES.—Owing to the late arrivals of oranges, lemons, bananas and other fruit the demand for apples has been materially diminished.

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Under a good demand prices are steady at \$7.00 to \$7.50 per case, for repacked

fruit, and in boxes at \$2.00 to \$4.00, as to quality.

LEMONS.—The heavy arrivals have had a tendency to depress prices, but the demand at the late low rates has caused a decided demand.

GENERAL MARKETS.—SALT FISH.—The only kind of importance selling is cry cod, which has been placed at \$3.25.
