

those multinational oil companies. It helped to ensure that those products which were developed were British in origin and were effectively exported. There are thousands of people in that office who are specialists and engineers.

Our agency is a joke. It is not the fault of the people involved who are working hard and with commitment; it is a result of the absolute lack of commitment by this government, in terms of person years and financial commitment to that office, to make sure that Canadians capture the benefits to be derived from a marine industrial strategy. It is an extremely sad situation. I do not know who in the government can take responsibility for its monitoring policies but there is nothing but inter-departmental chaos. It is an extremely sad situation where one department fights with another, with Transport, Finance, Industry, Trade and Commerce and National Revenue all working at cross purposes to each other.

It is vitally important that Canadians capture a full measure of benefits from this last bang at a major resource. I am sure all members of the House want to maximize those benefits for our children and future generations. The very clear message at the bottom of this is that it cannot be done at the destruction of the environment of many traditional communities, whether it be the east coast, north coast or west coast of this country. Those benefits must remain in Canada and the traditional communities must receive an enhancement.

Another question which must be resolved is where we must proceed with our monitoring policy and protection of Canadian consumers. If the government is going to proceed with this series of energy bills, it must bring forward companioned and coherent legislation. We must look at maximizing benefits and developing effective requirements, even if they are regulatory, and dictate how companies should deal with our resources. Basically, the theme should be the capturing of benefits and maximizing those benefits for Canadians. As well, we should have companioned or coherent legislation which would see effective competition policies in this country which would stop the combination activities of companies like Imperial Oil, Shell, Texaco and other multinationals such as we have seen between 1958 and 1973, and even continuing from then to the present. There are some officials in the government who say that those activities are still occurring today. We need the companion activities which go with this legislation and we need a strong commitment by both the government and the opposition to ensure those benefits come to Canadians and that we do not sell out this opportunity.
