Duchess of Argyle. The Hindoo with the yellow clothing and white turban is one of Her Majesty's Indian Attendants; Her Highland Gillie, who died last year, is indistinctly seen outside in the porch-way.

The Indian Official standing on the opposite side of the entrance is the Munshi, Hafiz Abdul Karim, C. E. I., the Queen's Indian Secretary, and said to possess great influence. At his side stands Gen. Sir Henry Ponsonby, P.C., G.C.B., who for many years was the Queen's Private Secretary; he was 6 ft. 2 in. in height. Beyond him is seen in the shadow of the archway, Gen. Sir John McNeil, (Equerry) who accompanied the Prince of Wales to this Country in 1861.

The tall gentleman next the pillar is LORD HAWKES-BURY, (Lord in Waiting) and over his shoulder the head of the Librarian, LIEUT.-COL. HOLMES is just visible. On this side of the pillar are the Doctor, SIR JAMES REID, and LIEUT.-COL. SIR FLEETWOOD EDWARDS (Assistant Keeper of the Privy Purse). FATHER G. LONGINOTTO, Rector of St. Edward's is easily distinguished as the clean-shaven man with the strong, handsome, expressive face. Beyond him the tall, fine, military-looking man with white hair and moustache is LIEUT.-COL. CLERK, Private Secretary to H. R. H. PRINCESS BEATRICE; and at his side is LIEUT.-COL. THE HON. WM. CARRINGTON (Equerry).

The German Secretary, Mr. MUTHER, stands just behind the priest, and beyond are seen the Inspector and Deputy-Inspector of the Castle, Mr. Leonard Collmann and Mr. Miles.
