Thirdly; To enforce the navigation-laws in their utmost extent; which will operate equally to increase the shipping, seamen, wealth, and power of the nation; give life

them, but, at the fame time, have duty, freight, and fea-hazard, all operating upon them, in proportion to their distance from the districts that abound with coals. To awaken a general spirit of improvement, the tax should be reversed. It should be laid on at the collieries, and either paid on all the coals indiscriminately, or those at a certain distance should be entirely exempted.
