GERMANY'S DREAM NOW SHATTERED

HANATAUX POINTS OUT HOW KAISER LONG PLANNED TO RULE WORLD

were inventoried in advance the means of defence exploitable and the riches of the countries coveted. Universal espionage prepared the way for world conquest.

As moral proofs of Germany's purpose, M. Hanataux cites the growth of the competition in Germany that a successful conquest is its only justification, and that "the German people were the chosen people, the predestined people in the religious, philosophic and scientific sense of the word; that everything in the world untouched by German influence must remain retrograde and inferior."

M. Hanataux adds: "The Germans are fighting for the enslavement not the liberation of the world. France will not let herself be turned aside. She struggles for ideals which are hers; justice is greater than force; right protects the weak; every man and every people has the right to dispose of his own. These notions are opposed to those of Germany. Not once during the course of the negotiations preceding the war did France put forward the slightest claim or offer any bargain whatsoever. Not once did she say: 'What guarantees will you give? What will be my share? Other powers talked; France kept silent. It can be said that events passed without her participation. She only bore their burdens. The light has shone on two opposing systems. History has chosen—that is the first result of the war.'

Materialistic Heresies. "German theories, German doctrines and German morality are irrevocably lost. They appear now for what they are and they themselves have demonstrated what they are: Frightful materialistic heresies. The first of all we have saved the truth."

Now it is the turn of justice and of right. Already Germany by the failure of her campaign of conquest overwhelmed by the immense losses which are draining her, conscious of the utter ruin which grips her, seeks to escape the consequence of her own theories and would be content with the white peace of a stalemate—counting herself well off to be able to present herself for the future. But not even this negative result will she obtain. The two theories of life are radically opposed. One or the other must succumb. Following in the wake of the German doctrine German force now likewise is on the decline. One more effort, tho it requires another year, and both will be cast into the abyss."

PORT HOPE MURDERER COMMITTED SUICIDE. Edward Tate, Who Killed Daughter, Hanged Himself in Cobourg Jail.

COBOURG, Aug. 1.—Yesterday morning Edward Tate, who on Monday last, at Port Hope, killed his 13-year-old daughter with an ax, was found dead hanging by a sheet in his cell at the county jail here. Following his statements that he deserved to be hanged, the authorities, fearing that he would attempt to kill himself, removed all his clothing from his cell. A prisoner in the next cell, who was told to keep a strict watch on Tate, knew nothing of the tragedy until informed by the jail officials at 6 o'clock yesterday morning.

Tate was 46 years old and leaves a 15-year-old daughter and his widow (his second wife).

MONTREAL HOTEL OWNER SHOT HIMSELF THRU FEAR. Antonio Manetti, Wealthy Italian Lived in Dread of Fellow Countryman.

MONTREAL, Aug. 1.—Antonio Manetti, a wealthy Italian, proprietor of the Massina Hotel, St. James street, in this city, shot himself thru the chest in his hotel last night at 8 o'clock. He has been conversing with his two sons a few minutes previously and they had had no intimation of their father's suicidal intentions. It is supposed Manetti took his life thru fear of Pasquale Bianco, who was recently released from St. Vincent de Paul Penitentiary, where he had been confined for over four years for slaying Manetti with a razor. Bianco is now in New York.

FARMERS ARE UNABLE TO HARVEST CLOVER

A good deal of anxiety is felt out in the county at the failure on the part of the farmers to secure their crop of alsike clover and fall wheat, especially the latter. Alsike clover has been cut for two weeks or more and the continued turning in an endeavor to get it dry, results in much loss of seed. Few farmers have saved half their alsike crop, while 75 per cent of the fall wheat is standing in the stock awaiting dry weather.
