Several Militia Organizations to Visit Capital During August.

Boston, July 16.—Several local military organizations are perfecting arrangements for a trip to Ottawa, Canada, on Aug. 18, when they will be the guests of the 43rd Regiment of that city. This organization, it will be recalled, came to Boston the same part of August last year as the guests of the British Military and Naval Veterans' Association. While the several hundred members were here it was planned that this local British organization and others should receive as similar courtessy at the hards of the Ottawa.
