New York, Nov. 11.—Senator John Sherman of Ohio, who is at the Fifth-Avenue Hotel, talked freely to-day about the outlook for legislation in the next Congress.—
"It will be necessary to pass a tariff measure at once," he said. "The Dingley Bill with some changes will do for the present. The Democrats made a great mistake in not permitting that bill to pass in the last Congress. It was only a temporary measure intended to raise the revenue that the Government absolutely needed, and if the Democrats had let it go through there would have been no necessity for bond issues, and the Democratic administration would have escaped a great deal of the censure and criticism that was heaped upon it. Of course it was right to issue bonds to save the credit of the nation, but the Dingley measure would have obviated the necessity. I would accept the Dingley bill as it is, although some changes might be advisable. It would be in force only a year and a half, and would give us the revenue we need."
