It appears that Mr. Campbell had for some time past been subject to attacks of dizziness and insomnia, and was in the habit of getting up in the morning and taking a walk out to the end of his own farm, a mile and a half from the village. About 6 o'clock this morning Mr. Campbell was walking on the pier, and was seen to stagger and fall into the water. He was not seen again until he was found floating in the water, near the shore of his own farm, a mile and a half from the village. His body was recovered by the fishermen, and was taken to the pier, where it was found to be dead.
