## RUSSIA WARNS CHINESE KEEP WITHIN GREAT WALL

Refusal to Heed the Hint to Be Considered a Breach of Neutrality.

St. Petersburg, March 10.—Russia has served notice on China that the latter must not send troops beyond the great wall, and that she must exercise her influence to restrain the Chinese bandits, who are partially under the control of Chinese officers, from interfering with their railroad, and telegraph lines. A refusal to heed this warning will be considered a breach of neutrality.

A report just received here through official military channels describes the Chinese forces as being an undisciplined and almost grotesque military organization, showing an entire absence of equipment and training.

As evidence of the unreliability of these forces the following occurrence is cited: A body of Chinese cavalry was paraded before French and German military attaches. The former asked the commander why the cavalry remained in the towns and had no field maneuvers. The Chinese answered: "We have no horses."

## BURDOCK NO CONSCIENCE BEFORE THE EMPIRE GLOBE

The Present a Favorable Time for the Production of Great Men in Canada.

Col. Mason presided at the Empire Club luncheon at Webb's yesterday and introduced Chancellor Burdock, who spoke on "Conscience as a National Asset."

Scholastic definitions were not appreciated, said the chancellor, and he would give one of his own.

Conscience involved a judgment and the emotion of the moral judgment. The emotion was of like or dislike. Depending on the judgment, proceeding from the emotion, there was an obligation.

Not until conscience asserts itself in connection with the family does the conscience begin to manifest itself in the state. In education many things are relegated now to the schools that once were attended to at home.

In business affairs conscience was necessary. Great tasks, great obligations, made men great. Where there were greater problems and responsibilities than in Canada? He laid stress on the withdrawal of emphasis from individualism. Corporations were said to have no soul. It was unfortunately true that members of a company did not seem to feel individual responsibility, and approved of deeds they would not do alone. This lessening of the sense of individual responsibility was ominous.

There had been a great growth of good-will among men and in religion. With that there had been a growing tendency to make light of conscientious scruples. Little things were not emphasized as they once were.

He denounced the worship of success and the admiration for a man who was a liar, dishonest, kicked out of decent society and a public nuisance, but was considered smart. Charles Dickens foresaw in this the undoing of the American people.

Success clubs were an evil in the churches. The spirit pervades society everywhere. It is only criminal to be a success club member.

Our young men were helping to build up another country because the price was there. The papers glorified success. Men formally were great on account of their character. The growth would conduce to a lowering of the moral standards of Canada, unless our statesmen had a wisdom and a most divine. He had great hope in the school, but objected to the theory that the child is impulsive and divine and all its appetencies were to be regarded. A moral weakness lay in this. The need of difficult tasks required emphasis.

Loud applause greeted the chancellor's declaration that the training of boys should be in the hands of men. As a boy grows he needs to be trained by a man and a public nuisance, but was considered smart. Charles Dickens foresaw in this the undoing of the American people.

The quality of the Canadian was superb. Physically, mentally and morally we were equal to the best and our heredity admitted of a marvelous evolution. The members of the Empire Club might be prophets and seers, men of vision. He used the word "national" in referring to Canada, looking forward to the time when the empire would consist, not of colonies, but of nations, involving an imperial idea better than any dream of the little Commonwealth, vision of a martial vision of a Kaiser.

Rescued Nine at Sea. The British steamer Cape Corrientes has arrived from an eventful voyage. During which she rescued nine men from the Russian schooner Emilia of Riga while steaming in mid-ocean. Escaped Murderer Caught. St. Joseph, Mo., March 10.—Facing death from pneumonia and death by the gallows, Mark Dunn, who after a long chase from St. Louis, Mo., was landed in jail here to-day, after a capture almost as sensational as his escape from behind the bars here last Monday. He is in a dying condition, and unless his disease intervenes he will be hanged in the jail yard here to-morrow. Dunn's capture took place at Grafton, Mo., where, after being shot by a posse of men, he was taken to a hotel, where he had taken refuge in an hotel, too weak to offer resistance.

Centralize Public Schools. Niagara Falls, March 10.—Stanford township is considering a scheme to centralize its public schools, and make one big graded school, to be attended by all the children in the township.
