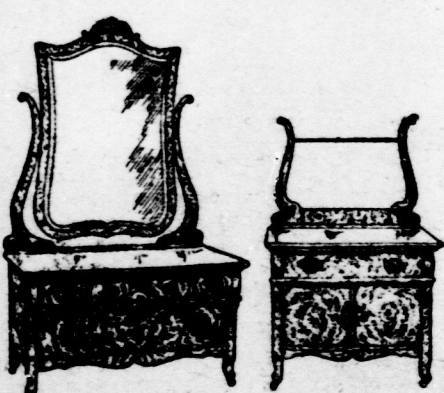

CANADA GETS BIG INDUSTRY

Trade With England in Butter, Cheese and Lard Lost by Yankees.

London, June 13.—According to statements made to your representative today at the office of the Canadian commissioner, Lord Strathcona, and those of the Allan line of steamships, the business of supplying Great Britain with farm products, which for many years was entirely in American hands, has been recaptured almost completely by the agriculturists of the Dominion.

"I was led to inquire into the subject by recent statements to the effect that Canada was making elaborate preparations to get control of this trade, but according to information received, the fight is now practically over and the victory already decided in favor of the Canadian producers.

"Not so long ago," said one of the Canadian officials, "the bulk of the butter, cheese and lard shipped to England came from the United States. Recently, however, this trade has passed to Canada."

"Well, the chief Canadian steamship line has equipped its ships with special facilities for carrying these perishable goods. They have installed splendid cold storage plants on each ship, which, in conjunction with the new Surrey dock just completed in London, have given them every advantage over American lines not so equipped.

"American farmers, in fact, have a serious grievance against the bulk of the farm products which come to England in first-class cold storage compartments kept better on arrival, and buyers are able to make surer profits than on those which are shipped without sufficient protection against deterioration.

"Moreover," continued this official, "the great new Surrey dock in London, built in connection with the Allan Line, enables ships with perishable goods to transfer their cargoes direct into cold storage without any handling whatever. Up to this time both Canadian and American ships have been going to Liverpool, where the goods are often resulting in loss—has occurred in getting perishable farm products from the ship to the warehouse. Now, however, Canadian goods will be brought direct to London, and merchants can visit the docks and make their purchases."

On inquiry at the office of the Allan Line Steamship Company in Leadenhall street, the manager said: "It is quite true that Canada has, within the last few years, succeeded in obtaining the bulk of the butter, cheese and lard industry. American farmers have either decided to devote their time wholly to the home market, or else the trade has fairly passed to Canada, through special advantages possessed by the latter. The equipment of the new dock will be an immense factor in helping Canadian farm products to reach the English market, and already our ships, trading direct between London and Canadian ports, are securing a big trade."

"Will American farmers be able to get this trade back?" was asked, "but first they will have to compel American ships to offer the same facilities that are being supplied by Canadian vessels today."

HOW TO WELCOME BRYAN

Hearst Man on Committee Desires All Politics Cut Out.

New York, June 14.—Lack of harmony regarding the character of the reception which should be tendered to William J. Bryan on his arrival here from his tour around the world marked the first meeting yesterday of the special committee named by the Democratic Commercial Travelers' Anti-Trust League at the Hotel Victoria.

Twenty-three members of the committee were present, each member with his own idea of how the affair should be run. H. B. Maurer, an ardent Hearst man, wanted the reception divested of all political significance and to be known as a welcome to one of the leading citizens of the country. Mr. Maurer's idea was not seconded and seemed to be generally disapproved.

The meeting furnished an interesting exchange of views. O. H. P. Belmont was there, as were Thomas L. Settemer, former president of the tax board; Judge Edward F. O'Dwyer, of the Democratic Club; Richard Croker, jun., Edward Field Gilotra, a wealthy St. Louis friend of Mr. Bryan's; Giles Allison and A. H. Eastmond. O. H. P. Belmont cautioned deliberation in making the plans. He said all elements of the Democratic party should be invited to participate, and that the plans should not be formed without giving the different wings of the party a chance to make suggestions.

A. H. Eastmond, vice-president of the commercial travelers' organization, said the reception was a tribute to Mr. Bryan as a distinguished radical leader.

"We would tender a similar reception to any one of four men—Roosevelt, Hearst, La Follette and Bryan—all distinguished radicals," he added.

The speaker threw a small-sized bomb into the meeting when he said: "I want to make public one thing that has never been made public before. During the campaign of 1904 the traveling men's organization which I represent had headquarters with the national Democratic committee in the Century building here in Thirty-fourth street. We made every effort to send out anti-trust literature and comfort for we made was promptly August Belmont and De Witt

Nicoll." Alexander Troup, of Connecticut, a close friend of Mr. Bryan's, and a former national committeeman, said Mr. Bryan had no patent on the next Democratic nomination for the presidency, but he favored welcoming him as a great Democratic leader.

WEDDING PARTY FEARED BLACK

The English Clergyman Would Have Protested Astor-Shaw Wedding.

London, June 13.—It was entirely due to fear of interference by the Rev. William Black that the recent wedding here of young Astor-William Waldorf Astor's son and heir—to Mrs. Shaw was kept so secret that a large number of their friends first learned that the ceremony had taken place through the announcement in the newspapers. It was the same reason that such profound secrecy was observed in the marriage of W. K. Vanderbilt and Mrs. Rutherford in London a few years ago.

Father Black, as he is always called, makes a specialty of protesting persons by clergy of the established church. He has been doing it for over a dozen years. He does it publicly at that point in the ceremony where the officiating clergyman calls upon anyone who knows of "any just cause or impediment" why the marriage should not take place to "speak out or forever hold his peace." Father Black accepts the invitation and speaks out.

The officiating clergyman may ignore it, but he can't choke off Father Black while he is making his speech. It causes a scene that is decidedly embarrassing to the bride and bridegroom. It goes into the papers afterwards and makes unpleasant reading for them and their friends. Wherefore, if they are rich, they spend money freely and take a lot of trouble to prevent Father Black. It would be interesting to know what W. K. Vanderbilt and young Astor spent to seal up the usual channels of publicity. I have heard that Mr. Vanderbilt paid to the complainant clergyman who agreed to tie the nuptial knot for him, and keep things quiet, \$5,000. And there were several others, of course, who had to be fed for keeping silence.

Father Black belongs to the ultra-high church party, and was formerly associated with the Cowley Fathers. He invariably dresses in a long, black robe, with a girdle around his waist like a monk. But aside from that, there is nothing suggestive of the ascetic about him. He is full of life and vigor, despite his 60 years, and his ruddy complexion indicates that he does not go in to any extent for the mortification of the flesh. The pictures that adorn his apartments show that he possesses a finely cultivated taste in matters of art. His firm set mouth denotes the man who possesses the courage of his convictions.

"I certainly should have protested against the Astor wedding," he said, "had I known when and where it was to take place, as those know very well who took such pains to keep it secret. The church sanctions separation between married couples for good cause, but it does not recognize divorce, and the remarriage of persons who have been divorced is distinctly contrary to the canons of the church. That is the position taken by the ecclesiastical head of the church, the Archbishop of Canterbury, and the Bishop of London, in whose diocese the Astor marriage took place."

WITNESS DIDN'T APPEAR

Insurance Commission Adjourns Until Ex-Manager Patterson Is Found.

Toronto, June 13.—The Dominion insurance commission adjourned this morning for one day owing to the fact that Mr. A. J. Patterson, formerly manager of the Home Life Insurance Company, had neglected to obey the summons of the commission to appear as a witness. Mr. Patterson, junior counsel for the Dominion Government, in moving for the adjournment, said it would lessen the dignity of the commission to permit any witness to ignore its authority. The evidence, he added, might possibly be produced without the necessity of Mr. Patterson appearing, but he believed the commission should insist on its order being obeyed. The investigation will deal almost entirely with the administration of the Home Life Company prior to the amalgamation of the company with the People's Life, at which time Mr. Patterson resigned his position as manager. The present officials of the Home Life stated they had made efforts to locate Mr. Patterson.

HUGE JET OF FIRE

Bolt Strikes Flowing Gas Well and the Flames Leap 500 Feet.

Parkersburg, W. Va., June 14.—Eighteen million feet of natural gas is being consumed each day by a fire at Burnt House, in Ritchie County. The flames are rising 500 feet into the air, and the great fountain of fire illuminates the country for miles around. The clouds of the heavy smoke, while the vast column of fire sways with the wind and ever changing position and shape, keep thousands interested in watching the scene of splendor. The well was struck on Friday. The gas began to escape, and before the flow could be stopped the pressure had drilled the well, and 18,000,000 feet of gas flowed from it the first day.

Sunday afternoon workmen were endeavoring to stop the flow when they saw a thunderstorm approaching. With millions of feet of gas escaping into the heavens, and the accumulation of 24 hours in a vaporous cloud above the well, they knew the danger from lightning, so they left their work. Hardly a flash of lightning lighted up the heavens, and zigzagging across the sky, reached the gas.

There was a flash which lighted up the whole of Ritchie County, and 18,000,000 feet of gas was ignited at once. Old men who have spent their lives in the oil fields say that they never saw anything to equal the awful beauty of this tremendous flash. But the flames reached the well, and the gas which is pouring from it is burning like an immense gas jet 500 feet high. People
