No Pavement for King St.; Rock Asphalt Knocked Out
The city council last night knocked out the proposed rock asphalt macadam pavement for King street, between Wellington and Maitland streets.

When the clause of No. 2 committee came up, proposing that Bilghe & Feller, of Chatham, be given the contract for the work, Ald. Garratt moved the adoption of the clause.

Several of the aldermen felt that it was a mistake to put down a pavement of this character, inasmuch as it could only be guaranteed for three years.

The vote was taken on Ald. Garratt's motion, and defeated on a negative vote. The clause was then dropped, the aldermen being absent at the time.

Yess—Ald. Gerry, Wyatt, Garratt, and the mayor.

Nays—Ald. Cooper, Forristal, Gillean, Stevenson and Matthews. Forristal had voted without a full knowledge of the motion, and he asked to be allowed to vote yes, so as to have the pavement laid.

"I would rather have rock asphalt than none at all," he said.

It was too late, however, and the vote as given above was allowed to stand.

Ald. Forristal then gave notice of motion to have the matter reconsidered at the next meeting of the council.

Bowlers Get the Money.
After a half hour's discussion, it was decided to hand over the sum of \$250 to the joint bowlers' associations of London to pay for a banquet to be tendered the English bowlers when they visit London.

Their visit has been some friction between the city fathers and the bowlers over who should control the affair, and the council took this means of washing its hands of the entertainment.

It was argued that if the city was not careful the bowlers would spend \$1,000 or more on the entertainment and then look to the city to pay half the cost. The aldermen did not like this prospect, and voted to give the grant outright and unconditionally to the bowlers.

The bylaw for an asphalt pavement on Park avenue was passed. The council is putting down this pavement under the two-thirds vote clause of the municipal act, the property-owners having agreed to the plan.

A motion was put through to authorize the mayor and Chairman Forristal of the finance committee to borrow the sum of \$12,000 at 4 1/2 per cent from any bank in this city to carry the cost of improvement works for which the city has as yet been unable to sell the debentures at a satisfactory price.

The city asked O'Hara & Co., of Toronto, 99.5 for the debentures, but the firm would not see its way clear to selling them at that price.

The city will now have 8 months in which to attempt to sell the debentures satisfactorily.

Band Concerts.
In reply to an inquiry, Chairman Forristal stated that so far no action has been taken regarding band concerts. He suggested that the matter be left to No. 1, as the Seventh Band is to be disbanded and a new band organized.

Ald. Garratt moved that the \$300 for band concerts be expended at once in alternate concerts in Victoria and Queen's Parks, and the motion carried.

Price. Cooper moved that the first concert be given in Queen's Park on Thursday night. This was also carried.

Ald. Matthews, seconded by Ald. Stevenson, moved that the sum of \$300 be set aside for the band.

Ald. Forristal opposed the motion. The incidental account is now almost spent, he said, and to carry out Ald. Matthews' idea would be to run the council for an overdraft.

Ald. Matthews promised that No. 3 committee shall make up, if not all, nearly all, of the extra \$300.

A motion to reconsider the question of the original grant was then put and carried. Cooper moved that the first concert be given in Queen's Park on Thursday night. This was also carried.

Improvement Petitions.
The following petitions for cement walks were received: Carlton avenue, between William and a point east; North Beaufort, between Gunn street and the Wharncliffe road; West Lansdowne avenue, Nelson to Trafalgar; east side Maitland street, between Nelson and a point 300 feet southerly; North Gray street, Pearl to Rectory; West Ridout street, north side Judge Meredith's property to Duchess avenue.

Also for a cement curb and gutter on the Wortley road, Askin to Bruce; and for a sewer on Central avenue, from Talbot street to a point 175 feet west. All petitions were sent to No. 2 committee.

W. West asked for the use of the city hall for the master bakers' convention to be held here on Aug. 14 and 15. Delegates will be present from all parts of Canada. Granted.

School Board Gives Popular Teacher a Retiring Allowance of \$800 a Year.

A NEW AUDITOR FOR WATERWORKS

H. C. Screaton Named by the Commission to Succeed Late Mr. Jewell.

At a meeting of the water commissioners held yesterday afternoon Mr. H. C. Screaton was appointed auditor for the board in the place of the late City Auditor Jewell.

There were five applications—Messrs. A. Dale, A. Ellis, H. B. Ashplant, F. A. Jewell and H. C. Screaton, and on a vote being taken Mr. Screaton secured the position.

"How is the new water supply to be handled?" was the question brought up by Commissioner Saunders. After a little discussion, a motion was passed to request the engineer to investigate the Redmond Ponds source, as to the amount of water available, and to report to the commission at the end of one week.

Among the communications read was a letter from the Canada Foundry Company, notifying the commission that the balance due them on their account for machinery at Springbank amounted to \$2,700, and that they wanted a settlement immediately. The account will be paid.

D. H. Howden & Co. requested that the commission pay part of the expenses in connection with the putting in of a large water service on York street in rear of the G. T. R. depot. It is alleged that when the service was installed some time ago the Howden Company were informed that they would have to pay all the expenses incurred. The repairing of the pavement at that place this spring is included in the contract, and the company object to paying it. The matter was laid over until it can be ascertained what agreement, if any, was made with the Howden Company.

A recent inspection of the machinery at Springbank cost the commission \$25. The Canada Foundry Company made the inspection.

A petition for water service for six residences on Hackett street, East London, was referred to the engineer. The placing of new hydrants on business streets where new sidewalks are going down, was discussed. The matter was left to the chairman with power to act.

The report of the pumping engineer was submitted. It showed that 3,693,747 gallons have been pumped since the last meeting.

The Grand Trunk notified the commission that on the 1st of July it commenced pumping its water supply for locomotives from the river, and it requested that in making up the account this be taken into consideration. It was pointed out by some of the commissioners that at present there is no way of telling just how much water the G. T. R. is using, and that some arrangement should be reached whereby meters could be put in. Mr. Saunders was ordered to make a temporary agreement with the company, which will be subject to the sanction of the board.

Trustee MacRobert moved that all regular meetings of the board be dispensed with until the first Tuesday of September.

A special meeting will be called for July 12.

Trustee Teasdale asked that the inspector suggest whatever changes would be to the advantage of the teaching staff before that meeting. This will be done.
