President Johnson, basing his figures on the attendance at Cleveland last season, said that each club in the American League will turn over about \$30,000 to the Government in taxes. The Cleveland club finished second to the championship Chicago club in the point of attendance. Its receipts were close to \$350,000 Mr. Herrmann stated that he would recommend a player limit of 18 men, but that he would oppose a 140-game schedule.

# FOULLY MURDERED

Bolsheviki Wreak Vengeance
for Opposing Armistice.

PETROGRAD, via London, Dec. 4.—
British Admiralty Per Wireless Press.—
An official announcement was issued today signed by Ensign Krylenko, the Bolsheviki commander-in-chief, confirming the killing by infuriated members of the Bolsheviki of Gen. Dukhonin, former commander-in-chief of the Russian armies, who recently was deposed because of his refusal to request German army officials to enter into an armistice with the Bolsheviki.

Gen. Korniloff, also a former Russian commander-in-chief, and who some time ago started an unsuccessful revolt against the Kerensky Government, fled from Mohilev before the arrival of the Bolsheviki forces.

The text of the communication of Krylenko follows:

"Today I entered into Mohilev at the head of the revolutionary troops. The headquarters was entirely surrounded without fighting. The last obstacle to the cause of peace has fallen.

"I cannot be silent on the sad act of lynch law practiced upon the forme."
