## INANCE MINISTER LIKELY TO BE SIR HENR

## WENT ON STRIKE, WHILE GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS DECLARE WALKOUT HAS BEEN FAILURE

Home Secretary Declares That Men Who Went Out Will Never Be Reinstated-Strike Order in Liverpool Was Obeyed by 400 Out of 1,700 Policemen There - The Strikers Will Not Be Allowed To See Lloyd George.

London, Aug. 1.—The police strike in London and the English provinces called suddenly vesterday in protest against pending legislation affecting police organizations went into effect today. While labor circles declared that some 65,000 policemen and prison officials throughout the country had left their duties, it was asserted by Edward Shortt, the home secretary, in the House of Commons during the late forenoon that the strike had been a failure both in London and in the provinces.

The secretary conceded that the strike order had been obeyed by about 300 policemen out of 1,700 in Liverpool.

'Policemen who are unable to give proper explanation of their absence from duty," the secretary continued, "will cease immediately to be policemen. Regarding Liverpool, I told the chief constable that I would fully support any step he considered neces-

In contrast with the home secretary's statement, it was announced at a meeting of strikers that the city police would come out in a body this afternoon. Strike leaders asserted that by 8 o'clock tonight there would not be a policeman on duty in London.

The newspaper declares that the London men struck with dramatic suddenness, and startling unanimity, implying that the whole force responded to the call. This is contrary to all other newspaper reports, which concur, whatever the future holds, that the call was generally ignored and up to the present the strike has been a failure.

General Sir Nevil McRady, chief commissioner of police, is quoted as saying at midnight that less than 250 men had struck, and that these will be dismissed and never reinstated. Marston, chairman of the policemen's union was among these men.

Sir Henry is a Conservative, although at no time has he been a strong party man. As head of the dominion railway commission for the last seven or eight years, he has given distinguished service, and through his position has been in close touch with Canadian financial and industrial conditions, He has, it is believed, some political ambittons, but is naturally somewhat rejuctant to give up the secure and congenial posi-
