TRIS SPEAKER TIES SISLER IN BATTING HONORS FOR LEAGUE

Joe Jackson and "Babe" Ruth Are Next in Line.

Chicago, Sept. 10.—Tris Speaker, manager of the Cleveland Indians, regained his batting eye during the past week and tied George Sisler, the St. Louis star, for batting honors in the American League, according to averages released today, and which include games of last Wednesday. Sisler went into a slump and dropped into .391, the mark which Speaker has attained. Joe Jackson of Chicago stands in third place with an average of .384, while "Babe" Ruth, the New York home run king, is in fourth place with .375.

Ruth cracked out his 48th home run during the past week, and broke the home run record held by Perry Weir of Minneapolis. He is now the greatest home run hitter of all time. Speaker is leading the run-getters, with 110 runs to his credit, while Rice of Washington, is far in front in stolen bases with 49.

Nicholson of Pittsburgh has dethroned Hornby of St. Louis for batting honors in the National League. The slugging Pittsburgh outfielder is hitting .387, while the St. Louis star slumped to .355, with 28 runs of Boston pushing him with .351.

Williamson of Philadelphia, cracked out another homer and has brought his string up to .344, while Carey of Pittsburgh, continues to show the way to the base stealers with 48 thefts. Bancroft of New York is the best run getter, with 89 tallies.

SARNIA C. OF C. TO FIGHT TRANSFER OF GAS BY COMPANY

Reported Sending of Gas To Hamilton and Other Towns Causes Action.

SARNIA, Sept. 10.—It was announced tonight that the Sarnia Chamber of Commerce may take action as a result of a rumor that one of the gas-producing companies in Dover Township recently made a contract with the Dominion Gas Company for their output, and if this contract is carried out that 700,000 cubic feet from this company will go to Hamilton and other places. At the present time Sarnia, Chatham and Windsor are getting the benefit of this production, and to cut off this quantity in the face of the winter would be a serious matter. By building a pipe line along the shore the Dominion Gas Company could take care of this piping, and they might induce other producers in the Dover field to give their production to others than the Union Gas Company and make the West suffer a shortage.

Successful Season.

The steamer Noronic, which leaves on Saturday on the Leitch cruise, will make her last trip of the season, and on return will go into winter quarters. Trips to Duluth will terminate on the completion of the sailings of the Noronic and the next trip of the Harmonic, which left here Thursday, and the steamer Huronic, which leaves on Tuesday next. The two later boats will handle the traffic to the Soo, Port Arthur and Fort William until the close of the season, which, according to reports, has been one of the most successful in the history of the line.

Relaying Tracks.

An agreement having been reached between the city and the Sarnia Street Railway Company, work was commenced today on the changing and relaying of the company's tracks at the corner of Wellington and Milton streets, the railway company with a slight concession from the municipality agreeing to finance the work.

Building Active.

Sarnia's prosperity is evidenced by the amount of building done during the month of August, when 64 permits totalling \$104,454 were issued as against 52 permits amounting to \$70,746 for the month of August, 1919.

AGAINST WORK ON RADIALS AT PRESENT

Damasus, Ont., Sept. 10.—A. A. Powers, president of the United Farmers' Co-operative Company, addressed the United Farmers of Ontario Club at a garden party here tonight on the hydro-electric commission's radial railway projects.

Mr. Powers dealt with the financial aspect of the matter, and took the ground that the present was not an opportune time for pushing radial railway schemes.

EUROPE'S BIGGEST COLD STORAGE

Liverpool Sept. 10.—A cold storage plant which will be capable of accommodating 30,000 tons of foodstuffs, including meat, fish, poultry, eggs, butter, cheese and other commodities, is nearing completion. It will have a cubic capacity of over 3,000,000,000 feet.

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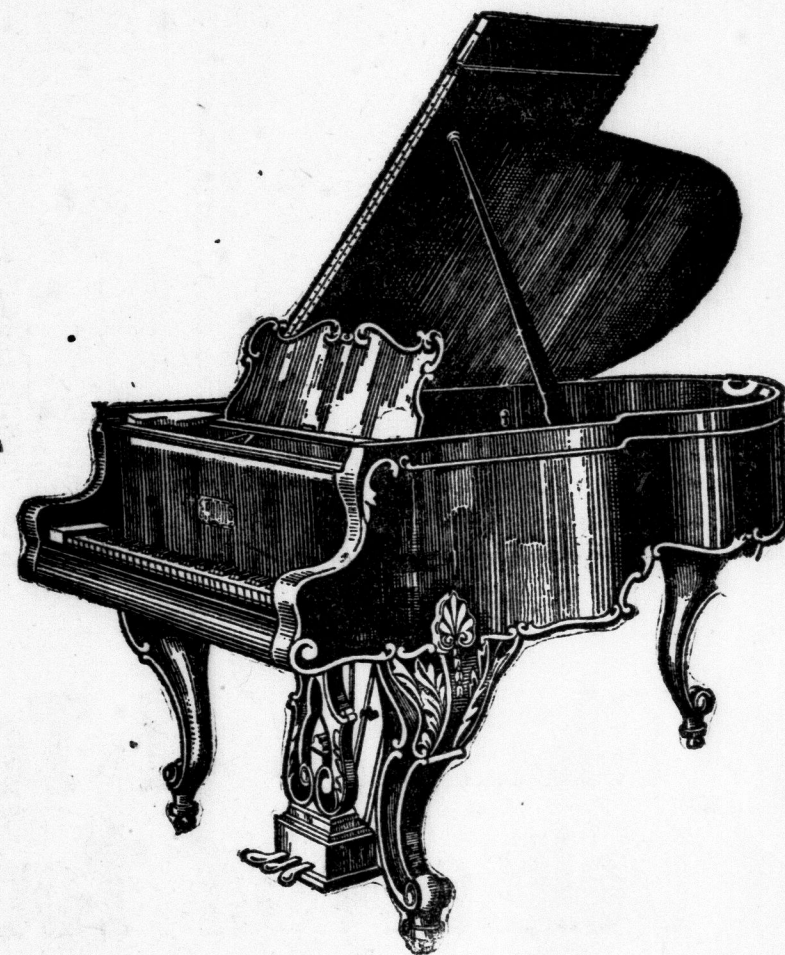
