

## Pastor Russell's Sermon

FOSTORIA, Ohio, Nov. 20.—Pastor C. T. Russell, of Pittsburgh, Pa., preached twice here in the Opera House to large and intelligent audiences. We report one of his discourses from the text, "Now the end of the commandment is love out of a pure heart, and of a good conscience, and of faith unfeigned: from which some having swerved have turned aside unto vain jangling." (1 Tim. i, 5, 6). He said:

In our text and in other passages of the New Testament, the translators have used the word charity instead of the word love, whereas usage to-day gives a slightly different signification to the word charity. Let no one therefore think that the apostle meant the end of the commandment is charity, in the sense of benevolent alms-giving, but understand the text as we have quoted it: "The end of the commandment is love." Rightly understood and thoroughly accepted and acted upon our text may prove to be one of the most helpful in the Bible to the Lord's consecrated people. If we were called upon to shoot at a mark it would be the word love, the word which is as to what object constituted the mark. If we were to run a race for a prize it would be very important for us to know the route, the path, the way, what would constitute the end of the race, the mark which we must reach in order to be declared winners. God reveals to us in the Bible the way now selecting a special class, a "little flock," a "peculiar people," to be associated with the Redeemer in the glory and work of the millennial age. He points us to the world of mankind, declaring that "the whole world is wicked" and that the "law of the Lord is perfect, converting the simple, and making the wise to be fools, and increasing the multitude of the just, and turning the multitude of the wicked into less than a drop, and removing them as the chaff from the threshing floor, and as the stubble before the wind, and as chaff before the whirlwind." 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## SALVATION ARMY BAND.

Some Interesting Facts About This Prominent Musical Organization.

Commissioner Coombs of the Salvation Army may be justly proud of his territorial staff band, which, although comparatively young organization, has already won for itself a front rank place in the Canadian musical world, and this in spite of a difficulty that does not confront any other musical combination, namely, the limited supply of the music to be played.

While the world's market of compositions is open to other bands, the music at the disposal of the territorial staff band is, either in composition or arrangement, the production of some member of the army, and which has passed the critical ear and scrutinizing eye of an expert musical board, which sits in regular periods in London, England, and which considers only such pieces as are suitable and fitting with the methods adopted by the army for the prosecution of its work. The members are inspiring and the selections often include old and familiar hymns and tunes, which form the ground work for brilliant and attractive arrangements.

The members composing the territorial staff band with one or two exceptions are officers of the Salvation Army, and are attached to the territorial headquarters in Toronto in various capacities, such as departmental heads, assistant managers, accountants, cashiers, architects, secretaries, clerks, etc.

"Not only does the term" made by the Salvation Army apply to the music played by its organization, but the instruments used are manufactured at the army's own factory, and the scarlet tunics worn are the productions of the tailoring department, and even the players themselves have been trained since entering into the ranks, and great credit is due to Brigadier H. Morris, the band's director and conductor of the band, whose object is purely evangelistic, no monetary consideration being received by any of its members. Since the inauguration of the band, it has held itself in readiness to respond to the invitation from even the smallest town.

On the occasion of the visit of General Booth to Canada last year, the band was privileged to accompany him to Montreal, Quebec and the Maritime Provinces. The composition of the territorial staff band is purely brass and along similar lines are the "Besses of the Barr" and "Black Dyke" bands. It also includes selections from an excellent male voice choir and quartet. The officer directly responsible for the territorial staff band is Lieut.-Colonel Thomas Howell, who will be the speaker in connection with a special service to be conducted by the band at the Massey Music Hall on Sunday night.

**Colportage Mission.**—George Bucklin, agent and missionary of the Evangelical and Caportage Mission of Algoma and the Northwest, has published his twenty-fifth annual report. The dictionary for the Ojibway Indians has been completed, making seven various editions published for the company, and also thirty other translations of books and tracts published by the mission, some of which are in four languages.

The amount contributed has been \$1673.43, Toronto's share being \$205.55. Eleven hundred copies of Scripture and books have been supplied in twelve languages, for which \$139.08 has been received. There is an indebtedness of \$237.72. The assets over liabilities are \$154.28. Forty-five thousand seven hundred and twenty-six copies of Bibles and books in twenty-three languages have been supplied.



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## MOIRA RIVER WATER POWER.

Strong Deposition Waits on the Provincial Government.  
Moira River has a water-power which, by appropriate damming, may be made to yield 23,800 electric horsepower 24 hours a day. There is a natural storage basin in the part of Hastings County designed, and this has by drainage and forest clearing, been robbed of its supply. Concrete dams, to cost \$25,000, is estimated, would provide a continuous flow.

A deputation from the county waited on the minister of lands, forests and timber yesterday to ask assistance in this respect, with a view to supplying power to Belleville, Twedd, Macdonald and other towns adjacent. Hon. Charles Cochrane promised consideration.

The deputation consisted of Henry Corby, ex-M.P.; J. W. Pearce, M.L.A.; J. A. Johnson, M.L.A.; Angus Richardson, M.L.A., Hastings County, and Town Solicitor McKel, Belleville.

## EXHIBITION FOR MONTREAL.

Hope to Belong to the Great From Montreal.  
MONTREAL, Nov. 20.—At a meeting of the mayors and prominent citizens to-day it was decided to hold a permanent exhibition in Montreal each year from now on like the exhibition in Toronto only it is to be held on a much higher scale.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier has promised fifty thousand dollars towards the acquisition of the object, and the provincial legislature ten thousand. Although no site has been decided upon, it is more than likely that the exhibition may be on St. Helen's Island, which, some day or other will be connected with Montreal by a bridge.
