COAL CLAIMS JUMPED
Cassiar Co. Carry Their Troubles to Premier McBride.

VANCOUVER, B.C., Jan. 31.—(Special.)—Forty-two coal claims in Telkwa and Bulkley Valley, owned by the Cassiar Coal Co., an eastern corporation, of which Samuel Barker, M.P., Hamilton, Ont., is a prominent official, have been "jumped" for alleged non-compliance with the mining regulations. It is alleged that while the company paid an annual license of \$100 per claim every year, continuous development was not prosecuted as required by law.

THE CUSTOMS REVENUE
Govt. Expectations of Hundred Millions for Year Not Being Realized.

OTTAWA, Jan. 31.—(Special.)—While customs revenue of \$48,000,000 for the ten months ending to-day shows a decrease of \$1,023,027 over the previous corresponding period, the gain for the month, \$867,205, in a total revenue of \$4,529,981 shows a decrease.

Dolley Awarded \$1500.
James Dolley was awarded \$1500 by the jury in the assize court as damages against the McCann-Knox Milling Co. for injuries received thru falling down the elevator shaft. He claimed that he ascended to the second floor and as he was stepping off, suddenly and without warning, the elevator gave way and he fell to the floor below. He sued for \$5000 damages.

WARRINER, OF THE BIG FOUR, SAYS HE PAID \$1000 A MONTH FOR SEVEN YEARS AS BLACKMAIL.

CINCINNATI, Jan. 31.—Eighty-four thousand dollars was the price Chas. L. Warriner, defaulting local treasurer of the Big Four Railway, paid for a woman's silence. Fearing exposure of his short-comings, he gave Mrs. Jeanette Stewart Ford, an average of \$1000 a month for seven years, the payments stopping only when the exposure came from other sources November 2 last.
