

work. The work done is of two kinds, the personal work done by the individual members and the work accomplished by the members collectively as a Chapter. As it is impossible to make a definite report of the former, it is of the latter that we wish to speak. The most important thing done has been the formation of a Bible-class for young men which has met in the School-house every Monday evening during the Winter. Mr. Woodroffe, of Wycliffe College, one of our members, has at great personal inconvenience, taught the class which has been of a very interesting character, and has consisted in part of very profitable discussion on biblical subjects.

In an age when attacks are being made on the Bible from all sides and even from within the fold of the Christian Church itself, it is an encouraging sight to see young men meeting regularly on a week night for the study of God's Word.

The course of sermons specially to young men which was so successfully inaugurated last year is being repeated this year. Dean Carmichael, of Montreal, preached the first, on the first Sunday in December; the Bishop of Algoma the second on the first Sunday in January; and the Rev. G. Osborne Troop, Rector of St. Martin's Church, Montreal, the third, on the second Sunday in February. On each occasion the Cathedral was crowded to the doors, a large proportion of those present being young men. There will probably be two more sermons in the course, one by the Rector and the other by Bishop Garrett, on the 22nd of May.

The Chapter held two open meetings this season, at one of which the Rector gave an address on "The Greatest Book in the World," and at the other Messrs. L. H. Baldwin and T. R. Clougher, of Grace Church, gave addresses on "Manly Christianity." These meetings were both interesting and satisfactory.

Other methods of work have also been carried out, such as hotel visiting, Esplanade work and visiting of young men at their homes and boarding-houses, and it is hoped that in the warmer weather some work may be done among the men employed on the vessels at the harbour.

We cannot conclude this report without alluding to the Convention of the Canadian Brotherhood held in this city in February last. It was gratifying to notice so many of our congregation attending and taking an interest in this Convention; it is one that will not soon be forgotten. What could be a more encouraging and impressive sight than to see so many young men gathered together from all parts of the Dominion and met there for one purpose and with one object in view—The spread of the Master's Kingdom.

The work of the Chapter for the year has been steady and unobtrusive, but on that very account, we have reason to hope, more lasting and effective.
