## AMATEUR SPORT

Some remarks that were made by Mr. Frank White at the Marathon baseball team's dinner on Wednesday night are worthy of more than passing thought. The members of the club had just complimented Mr. White, and the chairman had referred to him as not merely the president of the Marathon Club, but as a representative of clean amateur sport, of whom the city was justly proud.

Mr. White, in his response, referred to past events in the athletic field, and as a contrast with more recent exhibitions of professionalism, which invariably leads to rough play, and to results which are not in the interests of clean sport. Mr. White recalled the time some years ago, when he was a member of an amateur baseball team, not one of whose members received a cent of money, and who frequently put a blight in their pockets and went down to the athletic grounds to practice, choosing rather to go without supper than to lose the opportunity to increase their efficiency on the diamond. It was very pleasing to listen to these remarks from a gentleman whose own record in athletics has always been above reproach. The Times commends them to the attention of all who are interested in any kind of sport in the city of St. John.

If the city is to regain the proud position which it has more than once held in the sporting world, its young men must make up their minds to devote themselves earnestly to athletics without thought of purely financial considerations. There is abundant material here to produce strong individual competition, and strong teams, in every kind of athletic sport. Mr. White pointed out on Wednesday evening that the amateur ball players of his time were able to hold their own very creditably in competition with visiting teams from the United States, and the latter, after a series of games here invariably went away with a new and healthy respect for the stamina and last year, there was a considerable increase in popular interest in baseball and general athletic sports. Let us hope that the coming summer will see a still further growth of interest to the extent that the young men who are engaged in sport will find themselves backed by the sympathy and support of the people.

Too much emphasis cannot be placed upon the importance of athletics in the up-building of the manhood of a nation. The keenest minds in the country have declared this statement to be true, and have again and again urged the people to pay more attention to the health of the body, even at the expense of some other and less arduous forms of pleasure. In the course of time, St. John, no doubt, will be provided with a great athletic field of the sort which should be found in every city of anything like its size. It is really surprising that the citizens have so long been content without a great field in which all the youth of the city might have an equal chance for physical development, and participation in those healthy exercises which mean so much to the physical welfare of the people.

## A PATROL WAGON

The need of a patrol wagon in the city of St. John was made painfully clear again on Wednesday afternoon, when a drunken woman was assisted partly to the police station by an officer, and hauled the rest of the distance on a sled, which was already partly laden with other goods. It was the only conveyance at hand, the policeman was tired out, and the crowd was growing in numbers, therefore he took advantage of the easiest way out of the difficulty, and the screaming woman was added to the load on the sled. Such an exhibition is a disgrace to the city of St. John. There have been many similar exhibitions, and no doubt, there will be many more. Whether it is a woman or a man who is thus publicly carted through the streets, followed by a crowd, usually of children, the spectacle is one which should bring a blush to the cheek of every respectable citizen. Surely St. John can afford a better advertisement than such a spectacle presents to the public view. The appeal of the Women's Council should be heeded. The city should have a patrol

wagon. It is one of the needs of a modern city, and failure to provide it is highly discreditable, not merely to the members of the city council, but to the whole citizenship which tolerates such conditions as at present exist.

## ON THE WRONG TRACK

The following paragraph is quoted from the editorial columns of the Fredericton Herald:—

"When the few appointments that may be available to Mr. Hazen are made, the fun will begin, the disappointed ones will immediately turn on their leaders with all the bitterness expended by defeat."

Such a condition as this paragraph suggests could only obtain in a party held together by what has been aptly styled, "the cohesive power of public plunder." Perhaps that is the kind of party with which the Herald is best acquainted, but it may be doubted if the statement applies at all to the party now in power in this province. It was against just such a state of affairs that the people declared themselves with such remarkable emphasis on March 3. They were tired of the bargain-hunters and the place hunters, and wanted better methods of government; otherwise, they would not have defeated the Robison administration by so overwhelming a majority. By that act, they have given notice not merely to the late government, but to the new one, that the conditions which have existed for so long will no longer be tolerated. Nothing could be more humiliating than to see such conditions as the Herald pictures as a sequel to the great popular declaration of March 3. No such results will follow. Mr. Hazen will choose his colleagues, and will make his appointments with an eye to the best interests of the province, regardless of the personal interests or petty jealousies of the individual, for if he did otherwise, he would deserve and receive the condemnation which was visited upon his predecessor in office.

The Times desires to direct the attention of the members of the Orange Grand Lodge to the fact that this newspaper was unable to secure satisfactory reports of the proceedings. It was due to no fault of the staff since application was made in the proper quarter. Presumably the members of the order generally recognize the value of publicity, and would be glad to have reports of all discussions of general public interest given to the public. Those to whom the task of preparing such reports is entrusted may always without difficulty discover how many papers there are in the city, and it is no doubt the feeling of the Grand Lodge that all papers should be treated alike.

The distinguished company of legal gentlemen who last evening assembled to honor Chief Justice Barker were able to do so without reservation. The chief justice is not only an eminent lawyer, but a man of the highest character, whose record at the bar and on the bench is at once an inspiration and an example to the younger men of the profession.

Ald. Bellock, in a letter to the Times, sets himself right on the question of a band stand. The report of what he said, which was given to the press, appears to have done injustice to his attitude in that matter.

The Sun says that Mr. Foster's speech on the budget was "weak and barren." A glance through the speech itself, as reported, shows both strength and suggestiveness, and a clear grasp of the subject.

The liquor interests of Canada are combining for self-defence, but have failed to secure the co-operation of the Manufacturers' Association. The latter fact is significant.

## HEAD OF GEORGIAN BAY CANAL SURVEY IS HERE

A. S. Laurent, of Ottawa, chief of the survey of the Georgian Bay ship canal was in the city yesterday on private business. He said that the report of the survey would probably be placed before the government before the close of the present session of parliament, probably by June, and that discussion and action, if decided upon, would follow.

The surveyors had been at work since October, 1904, he said, and the field work, which had been heavy, was completed about a year ago. There was a great deal of office work to do, as the whole project had to be formulated and estimates of the different routes given.

The canal embodied the French river, Lake Nipissing, a chain of smaller lakes, and the Mattawa river into the Ottawa. The total length would be about 400 miles though only thirty miles of solid land would have to be excavated. More than 600 miles had been surveyed, however, as alternate routes had to be mapped out. Rivers and lakes were sounded, borings made and the route selected, was chosen according to its feasibility. The whole canal was to be built on the lock system. Basin after basin would be filled, the gates raised and the boats carried along. The cost of the project is estimated at about \$10,000,000.

Before examining Capt. J. E. Murphy in Yarmouth a few days ago, the following were granted certificates: Master of sailing ship, Elmore N. Parker, of Walton; master of passenger steamer in minor inland waters, A. H. Hasset, of St. John; mate of passenger steamer in minor inland waters, A. B. Lambert, of St. Andrews.

Steamship Kestrel, of the Donaldson line, now on her way to Glasgow from this port, has on board a cargo worth \$144,000. Among her cargo is 4,883 bushels of wheat.
