Last Year's Winner of the R. K. Y. C. Cup Will Defend It This Year.

MONCTON, N. B., June 11—(Special)—William Ganong, manager of the Hotel American shipped today to the chairman of the sailing committee of the Royal Kennebecasis Yacht Club, the cup held by him since last year.

In 1906 this trophy was won by Glencairn IV, owned and sailed by Mr. Ganong, and the defense of the cup in the annual race is taken place Saturday next. The holder of the cup will be sailed by the owner, who will follow the cup to St. John in a day or two. Skipper Ganong hopes to bring back the cup and thus become the permanent owner. The trophy has to be won twice.

A REMARKABLE NEW DEVICE

Time Signals Sent Direct from St. John Observatory to Steamships Off Halifax.

The Meteorological Service of the Dominion of Canada, is now sending time signals from the observatory at St. John by telegraph to the wireless station at Campdown, near Halifax, where special apparatus has been installed to automatically transmit the signal to ships at sea within the zone of that station.

Time signals will be sent each week day morning as follows:—Beginning at 9h. 58m. a. m., Atlantic time, dots are made each second up to and including 9h. followed by a dot at 9h. 59m., then an other pause of two seconds follows; the clock then makes dots each second up to and including 9h. 59m. 59s., a pause is then made, followed by a dot at 10h. a. m., Atlantic or Standard time of the 60th meridian west longitude, equivalent to 2h. p. m., Greenwich mean time.

The apparatus referred to was devised by D. L. Hutchinson of the St. John meteorological observatory.
