If imported from any British Colony out of Europe after the 27th June, 1845, or from any part of the world after the 1st February, 1849, the following duties shall be levied upon all Wheat, Barley, Bear or Bigg. Oats, Rye, Peas, and Beans:—For every quarter 1s. sterling—about 14d. per bushel. Upon all Flour or Meal made from Wheat, Barley, Oats, Rye, Peas, or Beans, for every cwt. 44d., and so in proportion for a less quantity—(this will be about 8d. per barrel on Flour).

General Regulations for other kinds of Flour and Meal than Wheat:-

Barley Meal, for every 217½ lbs., the duty to be equal to that payable on one quarter Barley. Rye Meal and Flour, for every 196 lbs., the duty to be equal to that payable on \$ths of a quarter of Barley. Pea Meal and Bean Meal, for every 272 lbs. the duty to be equal to that payable on one quarter Barley. Oat Meal, for every 181½ lbs., the duty to be equal to that payable on one quarter Barley.
