## Former St. John Man is Killed

Sergeant Harold Phillips Wolhaupter,  
recently killed in action, was a son of  
Mr. and Mrs. G. B. Wolhaupter, who  
formerly lived at 146 Leinster street,  
but moved to St. Catharines, in On-  
tario, some years ago. He was killed on  
May 8 at the battle of Fresnoy, and  
was only twenty-two years old. He  
comes of Loyalist stock, and is a grand-  
son of Lee Phillips of Bath (N. B.).

June in safety. He leaves his parents,

26th in France, and two sisters to  
mourn.

WARNS AGAINST BUYING OF  
COAL FOR PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Business agents of schools through-  
out New England have been asked not  
to purchase coal or make contracts for it  
until the plans of the New England  
committee on coal have been completed.  
The request was sent in a letter by the  
conference of the public school business  
officials which declared that the situa-  
tion can be best handled through or-  
ganized effort. The letter also said there  
was great danger of aggravating the sit-  
uation if the schools should buy fuel at  
this time.

## F. J. DIXON, OPPOSED TO CONSCRIPTION, REFUSES TO RESIGN HIS SEAT

Winnipeg, June 22--F. J. Dixon, mem-  
ber of the Manitoba legislature, for Cen-  
tre Winnipeg, refuses to resign his seat  
in response to petition secured by the  
Army and Navy Veterans.  
The movement for Mr. Dixon's recall  
was instituted after he had criticised  
publicly the national service scheme.

## DISORDER AMONG RUSSIAN SAILORS AT SEBASTOPOL.

Petrograd, June 22--There have been  
disorders among the sailors of the Black  
Sea fleet at Sebastopol, to visit which  
the naval members of the American mission  
to Russia started on Monday.
