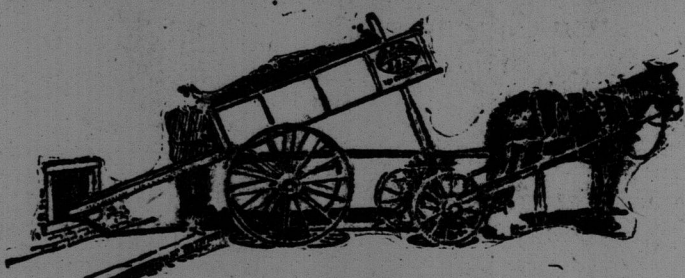

A WORTHY EXAMPLE.

Alderman George Senior (76), of Sheffield, an ex-Lord Mayor and Master Cutler, died on Sunday. A man "from the ranks," and known among the populace as "Our George," he rose to a position of affluence and became one of the most popular men of the city. He started work at eight years of age, earning 1s. 6d. a week at nailmaking. In 1873 he started business at Pond's Forge, and founded the firm of George Senior and Sons, now one of the largest importers of Swedish steel. He entered the city council in 1891, and was Lord Mayor in the coronation year of King Edward, and Master Cutler in the coronation year of King George. He learned to read and write at a little Sunday-school, and afterwards showed his gratitude by pensioning two of his old teachers. On the spot where he used to make nails he built four almshouses, and provided ample allowances for the inmates.

Maurice Vickers died at his home in Blackville on Tuesday evening. He was in his 65th year and is survived by his wife and large family, James Vickers, of Nelson, is a brother, and Mrs. Martin Murphy of Newcastle, a sister of the deceased.

The death of James Burns, of Bartholomew, Northumberland Co., occurred on Sept. 8. He is survived by his wife, three sons, Peter, Henry and William, of Bartholomew, and six daughters, Mrs. John Wall, Millinocket; Mrs. Patrick Donahue, Blackville; Mrs. Everett Donovan, Min. Hints for the Cook

Peach Pie.

Remove skins from peaches by allowing them to stand in hot water a minute, and then plunge into cold water. Cut in eighths and cook until soft, but not broken, with just enough water to keep from burning. Sweeten to taste and cool. When ready to serve, put peaches in a pastry foundation, already baked; cover with whipped cream, flavored to taste.

Escalloped Beef.

Cut bottom of round steak into cubes an inch square. Place a layer of meat in baking dish, then a layer of sliced onion, salt and pepper. Continue until meat is used. Add water, cover and cook in oven three hours. Thicken with flour and serve with mashed potatoes. This has a delicious beefy flavor.

Beef and Spaghetti.

Break spaghetti in two-inch lengths and boil in salted water. While cooking

ing, prepare the following sauce: Dice an onion, brown in a tablespoonful of butter, and add a can of tomatoes rubbed through sieve. Take half a pound of pork sausages and squeeze from skins in pieces the size of marbles. Add these to the sauce and simmer 15 minutes. Drain spaghetti and put in dish, sprinkle with grated cheese and pour over it the sauce. Set in oven for 15 minutes.

South American Salad.

Remove skins and seeds from white or red California grapes and cut in halves lengthwise. Add an equal quantity of shredded fresh pineapple, apples pared and cored and cut in small pieces, and celery cut in small pieces. Then add one-fourth the quantity of Brazilian nuts broken in pieces. Mix thoroughly and season with lemon juice. Add cream mayonnaise to taste.

Baked Spiced Beef.

Chop 2 lbs. round steak in the meat grinder, add to it 1 beaten egg, 1 cup milk, 2 teaspoons baking powder sifted in 1-2 cups bread flour. Flavor to suit.
