To the Editor of The Times-Star: Sir,—It was not my intention in any way to rush into print regarding the imploying of our local bands by the Exhibition Association this year, but here are one or two statements made in this morning's Telegraph-Journal which should not go uncontradicted.

First: There is no "controversy," as claimed by the headline, if by "controversy" is meant strife. When a Saint John markent each for John merchant asks for a quotation on a car of flour and because the price loes no suit, declines to buy, it is not isually considered an occasion of strife." The same conditions apply to the band situation. The Association in this as in everything else, is seeking o buy as economically as possible an object to paying more than is consid

ered fair.

Second: In my letter to the bands I did not say I was "considering" securing local orchestra players. I said "we have given the local orchestra boys" a contract. This contract was made weeks ago. Certainly the orchestral players have quite as much claim to consideration as the bandsmen.
