

FISTS FLY IN NATIONAL LEAGUE BALL GAMES

PLAYERS ARE WORKED UP TO FIGHTING PITCH

Closeness of Race Causes Rowdiness on Field—Many Players Banished

NEW YORK, July 26.—Players of the National League are at fighting pitch in one of the hottest races the circuit has known. Fists fly and there are protracted arguments with the umpires.

In yesterday's contest at the end of which the Pittsburgh Pirates had maintained a very slight advantage over Cincinnati with St. Louis close behind, four players and a coach were banished for brawls and arguments. They were Pincus and Pincus, of the Reds, and Blakes, Haines and Coach Bill Killefer, of the Cards.

The police were called in at Cincinnati and before the warfare was over, outfielder Wilson, of the Braves, had been rushed from the bench to struggle with a squad of officers and had been taken to headquarters.

Duke Pincus, third baseman of the Reds, and Arthur Devlin, old Giant third sacker, now coaching the Braves, were the first to become entangled and a free for all threatened.

Then in the next inning Pincus, Red catcher, and Welch, of Boston, had a brush. Duffin lost the decision, to Pincus, in the opinion of newspaper men.

At St. Louis Blakes argued a decision at second base and was joined by Haines and Killefer, with the result that all departed.

Boston downed Cincinnati 8 to 4, through heavy hitting, but the Cards won from the New York Giants 6 to 5, after 11 innings of a most exciting battle during which pop bottles filled the diamond.

Jess Petty, big left hander, had a "lucky day" with his team hitting behind him and set back the Pirates 3 to 1.

The Chicago Cubs won from Philadelphia 5 to 4. Ruth beat the Chicago White Sox with his 30th homer of the season, the blow scoring Gehrig in the sixth. The Yanks won 2 to 1.

Cleveland remained in the second place, nine games behind by humbling St. Louis 7 to 4, with five runs coming in the fourth.

The Detroit Tigers belted four Washington pitchers to all corners to win by 14 to 4. Harry Heilmann, of Detroit, made four hits.

AFTERNOON GAME

Three hits, two errors and a stolen base yielded the Trojans three runs to tie the score in the next inning, 7 all.

The Pairville outfit won in the fifth when Logan was passed and scored on McMurray's slashing triple to centre with one down. Nelson looked after the pitching assignment for the winners and although touched up for 14 hits, was able to turn the Trojans back at the right time. The latter, by poor base running and a blow-up of their infield at an important stage of the game, lost their opportunity to win.

The high lights were the felding of both shortstops and the hitting of Gary, who accounted for five of his team's eight runs.

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EVENING GAME

The evening game developed into a pitching duel between Kerr and Armstrong and the former allowed only five hits to his opponent's eight. But "Lew" walked three men in the fourth which, together with two beautiful bunts, a hit through Johnston, one stolen base, a sacrifice and one error, rushed four tallies over the plate, enough to win on top of the score made in the second. It was a well-played game with lots of inside baseball. Daley's great stop of Gorman's driving hit prevented further scoring in the fourth.

Armstrong's performance was very promising, as the best the Trojans could do was get hits bunched in only two innings and then only two bingles each time. He struck out five, passed but one and hit one. Kerr fell a victim to his slants twice, each time with somebody on. Except for the fourth stanza, Kerr showed some of his old-time form, and it looks as if his arm, which has bothered him all season, is improving with the hot weather. A Snodgrass got his only safety when he sent a daisy-cutter through the box to centre field in the second. The final safe blow of the Trojan veteran was Gorman's very scratchy three-pitcher to short right and if the ball had been played right by Devine it would have gone for a single.

With the score against them 5 to 2, the losers shoved across two runs in the eighth, two errors paving the way. They threatened again in the ninth when Morris singled through the box, advanced to second on Devine's roller

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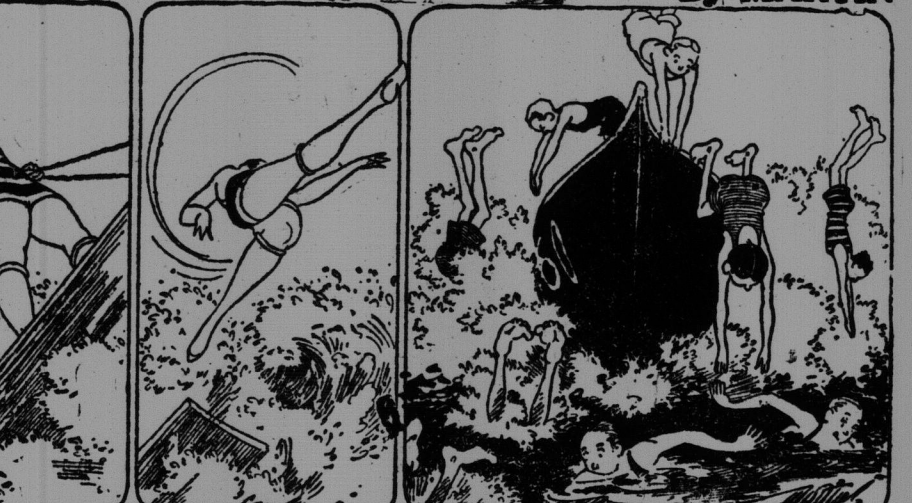
