DISCUSS PLANS FOR BOYS' GOOD

City Workers, at Beatty
Meeting, Hear Taylor
Statten

Tells Gathering if Boys' Lives to
Improve, Must be Through
Church

"I am thoroughly convinced of two things," said Taylor Statten, national secretary of the Boys' Work Board of the Religious Educational Council, at a supper party of Sunday school workers and clergymen in the combined salons of the Admiral Beatty Hotel last evening, "and they are that if we hope to improve the lives of our boys, it must be through the medium of the church, whether it be Protestant or Roman Catholic, and that the best way to present the Christ to these little fellows of the idealistic teen age, is in terms they can understand and appreciate."

THE IDEA SPREADING.
The Religious Educational Council idea with its Tuxis Boys, Trail Rangers, Canadian Girls in Training, which in turn have their conventions, parliaments, conferences, teachers' training schools, summer camps, etc., on a merit system, is the first real modern step in Canada to bring about this development in children of the teen

ages. At the emotional, formative period in young life it is well that Christ be presented in the highest, finest type of many personality. Already in this country 30,000 Tuxis boys are living in terms of Jesus.

FIELD SECRETARY SPOKE.
There were over fifty men at the tables when Fred Miles, of the Exmouth street United Sunday school took the chair as the newly appointed Saint John president, vice Newton Rogers, removed from the city. When the supper was over Rev. Waldo Machum, field secretary for the Maritime Provinces of the Maritime Religious Educational Council, gave a comprehensive outline of the work in hand in the three lower provinces and the membership enrolled. He told of Tuxis, Trail Rangers and Canadian Girls in Training groups, as representing 200 Sunday schools. Over 2,000 had attended conferences and camps, 400 were under canvas in summer, 800 attended winter institute gatherings. He stated that further extensions of the work should be in the nature of more intensive teacher training in winter time, a daily Bible school in vacation periods in Saint John, same as in several other places in the Maritime Provinces. He also mentioned the financial responsibilities resting upon the local workers.

L. W. SIMMS THANKS.
L. W. Simms said he would forego the hackneyed custom of proposing a vote of thanks to Mr. Statten, but praised him highly for his work and his presentation of the message. Mr. Statten voiced his appreciation of this.


ADDRESSES BOARD.
