

Judge's Decision.

The Chief Justice held that, if he was called upon to deal with the review of the registrar, that review would stand; but that the fact that the solicitors had agreed between themselves to stifle criminal prosecution by endeavoring to secure more money from an estate which, on the face of it, the estate could not pay, the court would not be a party to enforcing such arrangements and the solicitors must see that those things are carried out between themselves.
