TRAP SAFE-ROBBERS AFTER PISTOL FIGHT

Detectives Descend on Theatre After Explosive is Set to Fire-Woman Held as Lookout.

After a pistol fight in the Clinton street theatre, detectives of the loft and safe squad in New York arrested four men whom they had been training for six hours. Lieutenant John Stapieton said the men were blowing open a safe containing \$2,000. A woman, believed to have been acting as a lookout, also was arrested, as was the theatre watchman, Harry Rofosky, who, the police said, had talked to the prisoners in his room at 84 Clinton street for two hours before the men entered the theatre.

Early Saturday evening the detectives heard an attempt would be made to rob the theatre. Before midnight they picked up the trail of the suspects, who hired a taxicab in Harlem, and followed the men until they drew up at Rofosky's home about four o'clock in the morning. For two hours the detectives said they dustide. Then the men started for the adjoining theatre, the door of which they forced. The detectives said they then saw Mrs. Marie Rizzo, wife of one of the men, start a slow patrol up and down Clinton street and knock on the theatre door when patrolmen approached.

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When the detectives entered the theatre one of the men switched off the lights and all started to shoot. The police dropped to the floor, and after the suspects had emptied their pistols a detective turned on the lights. They said the men had the explosives all prepared to blow the safe.

Mrs. Rizzo is about twenty years old. She was arrested in a restaurant at Rivington and Clinton streets. The police said they found in her pocket a seat check for the Saturday night performance at the theatre.

marshes. Mills was to call for them. Shortly after Mills left them his boat was seized by creditors, and when the time came to go after the Murrays he had no boat nor money to secure one. It is claimed he said nothing to officials here about the plight in which he had left the family.

According to the story told by Murray when he was brought here Saturday, the family had little to live on except fish, wild duck and cranberries for nearly two weeks. Ammunition was giving out, and it was necessary to keep the camp fire going at all times because of the lack of matches. Had the fire gone out the suffering from cold would have been serious, as the temperature has been below freezing. There are no buildings on the island except the rude shack they constructed.

A fisherman rowed out to the island Thursday afternoon after noticing the fire, and learned their plight. Because of the size of his craft he was unable to take them off and notified the coast guards. The Murrays are without money or a home and have been given shelter in the coast guard warehouse for the time being.
