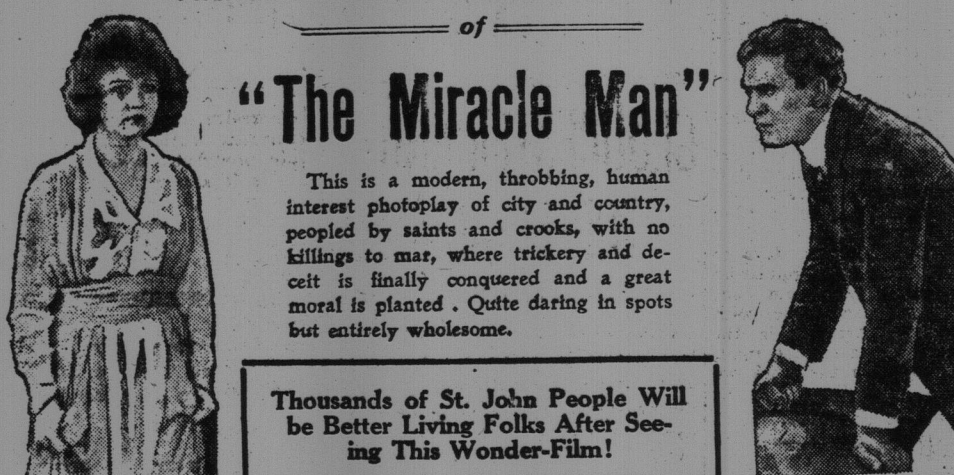

**Y. W. C. A. ARRANGE
FORMAL OPENING
OF NEW CENTRE**

The many and varied activities of the
Young Women's Christian Association
were reported on at the
meeting of the board of directors in the
King street building yesterday afternoon
when arrangements were made for the
formal opening of the new recreational
centre in King street east. The presi-
dent, Mrs. J. A. McAvity, was in the
chair and the opening devotional exer-
cises were led by Miss K. McK.
Matheson.

Reports were presented from the
King street Catering showing it to have
served 2,244 meals in twenty-eight days,
and to be in good financial shape. The
King street home had thirty permanent
boarders during December and forty-four
transients. The Travelers' Aid and
other projects of the Y. W. C. A. were
reported upon.

Mrs. Lawrence reported on the meet-
ing in Ottawa, said that Premier Foster
had assured her that New Brunswick
would support the hostels, although some
return for this support would be ex-
pected. Mrs. Gordon gave a report as
house mother and told how pleased the
immigrants were with the home. They
were amazed, she said, at the abundance
of butter and tea here, that is none too
plentiful in England. A letter from the
nurse in Halifax to Mrs. Gordon, speak-
ing of her as "Our Canadian Mother,"
was read. A sum of \$5.50 per week was
arranged to be charged to the hostels, who
remained in the hostel over the twenty-
four hours. It was decided on motion
that the council for immigration be af-
filiated with the women's council and
Mrs. Jenner was appointed as the first
delegate. Other matters were discussed.

**PLANS TO BRING
HOME OUR DEAD**

Toronto Undertaker Makes
Announcement of Project
Under Way.

Toronto, Jan. 20.—Robert U. Stone, an
undertaker of this city, says there is a
movement on foot and real arrangements
have been well advanced by an organiza-
tion known as the Overseas Mortuary
Association "to bring back the remains
of the heroic Canadian dead from Eng-
land, France and Belgium and bury them
in their own country."

Mr. Stone says it is a private enter-
prise and is the result of an increasing
demand on the part of relatives to have
their loved ones laid to rest in Canada.
He says that E. Teyssie, an undertaker
in Paris, France, is associated with him.
