The members of the Boys' Club were entertained last evening. An address was given by A. M. Belding, after which Mrs. C. E. Harding gave a musical recital. Mrs. W. F. B. Peterson told a number of interesting stories and also donated a parlor game to the boys. Mrs. W. E. McIntyre presided.

Formal Opening of Y.M.C.A. Hut

The formal opening of the Y. M. C. A. hut on the Barrack square was held last evening and was a marked success. Lieutenant-Colonel J. L. McAvity was in the chair and several addresses were given, including short speeches by His Honor, Lieutenant-Governor Pugsley, Premier Foster and Mayor Hayes. A very enjoyable program was also given.

The first address of the evening was given by George E. Barbour, who presented the hut to the military on behalf of the Y. M. C. A. committee. This address was replied to by Major S. Wetmore, acting for Brigadier-General Macdonell, who was unable to be present.

Major Wetmore accepted the hut, thanking the Y. M. C. A. for their splendid gift, and declared the hut open.

A short address was also given by Rev. G. A. Kuhnig, representing the clergy of the city, and also the chaplain service overseas. This was followed by a prayer of dedication.

Short addresses were then given by His Honor, Lieutenant-Governor Pugsley, Premier Foster, Mayor Hayes, and Rev. J. J. Smith and A. S. McAllister, of the Maritime Y. M. C. A.

A very interesting programme was then given and consisted of two solos by Miss Ermine Climo, a recitation and short address by S. C. Matthews; aesthetic dances by Miss Louise Waring, Miss Gregory and Miss Olivia Gregory.

Refreshments were served by the ladies of the Y. M. C. A. who are on duty this week at the canteen of the hut.

The entertainment hall occupies about half the building and in this is placed a good sized stage, a motion picture cabinet, and two small ante-rooms and toilet.

A modern billiard table, and piano and chairs for about 100 men are other features of the room. Shaded electric lamps hang in rows from the rafters.

Adjoining the recreation room is the canteen room, with counter and large assortment of cups. On one side is a well stocked pantry and across the room is the kitchen with stove and rest room.

A large reading room in which are the beginnings of a full set of lounges, easy chairs and tables, is the library. Here the soldiers will find a good supply of current periodicals and journals, and will be supplied free with writing materials.

Two class rooms to the left of the reading room complete the hut compartment. The buildings, it is hoped, will be a permanent feature of the barracks and is heated by three large stoves.

A. M. McLeod, formerly of the Red Triangle, will be in charge, and the hut is expected to be a boon not only to the soldiers in barracks, but to returned men living in Lower Cove.

Y.M.C.I. For Use of the Soldiers
Arrangements have been completed with the Young Men's Catholic Institute, Cliff street, whereby that splendid institution is now at the disposal of the Army Hut workers.

By securing the Y. M. C. I. the Army Hut K. of C. workers are able to offer to the men in khaki a splendid swimming tank, shower baths, tub baths, towels, etc., all free of cost.

The large auditorium in the second floor of the building is to be fitted out as a dining room, and every effort is being put forth to make it a very comfortable and attractive place for the soldiers. It will be equipped with two new pool tables and also with a billiard table. Writing materials will also be at hand, and will likewise be free of charge.

The room will also be well supplied with the latest magazines and reading matter. There will also be a well stocked canteen at the disposal of the soldiers. The canteen will be run by the Catholic Girls' Guild and will be a most up-to-date institution in very capable hands.

Soldiers will also have the free use of the gymnasium and physical equipment, while an extra bowling alley is also being fitted up.

The Army Hut workers have been very active since the signing of the armistice and have established an excellent canteen in West St. John. The following are the local committees in charge of the work:
