Milwaukee, Sept. 17.—Australian boxing news is usually interesting. The following has just been received by the writer: "Pat Brown, a Minnesota light-weight, has arrived in Sydney with his trainer, Jack Dougherty, Milwaukee. Brown will be matched with one of the local boys first and may meet Mohegan, Moran, or Wells later. Harry Curran of England met his second defeat at the hands of Bill Lang, and will now leave for home. Alf Spencer, a British light weight, will return to Australia from England and meet Mohegan. Jim Sullivan, who lost to Billy Page in England, was defeated by Pat Brown."

John Lester Johnson, whom the fans never heard of until about two months ago when he boxed one of the white boys and also Joe Jeantette, probably knows now that he is not a fighter of any class. Lester bunched up against Samuel Langford, in a scheduled 10-round bout in New York City. There was a short introduction in the center of the ring. Sam appeared pleased with the same, but Lester was shy. Then they took their corners and the referee waved his hand to the time keeper and it was "on." It was off again in just thirty seconds for the Tar Baby drove home two hard kidney punches and each time Lester remained down until the third man in the ring could count nine. On the third knockdown the referee said "ten" very quickly and Samuel gathered in \$1000 for his hard work. **The Championships.**  
Brookline, Mass., Sept. 18.—Playing of a calibre seldom seen in America, two of the trio of English professionals, forced to the front in the first half of the day.

Sydney, N. S. Sept. 18.—Threatening weather which finally ended in a rain storm, marred the play at the Martineau tournament, being held here today. The semi-finals were finished in the afternoon. H. J. McCann defeated C. W. Robinson, of Moncton, and Russell, Amberst, defeated J. McKensie, Sydney. The final 18, the championship, was played tomorrow. About seventy-five attended the dinner given by the club to the visiting champions. The inter-provincial match will be played tomorrow at 2 o'clock.

**English Entries Accepted.**  
Those Mackrell, honorary secretary of the Royal Canadian Golf Association, has announced that the entries of the three British players, Miss Dodds, Miss Mabel Harrison and Miss Gladys Ravenscroft, for the Dominion tournament, which opens at Montreal September 30, would be accepted. Mr. Mackrell stated, in fact, that they had been received and taken some time ago. The Royal Canadian Association made provision to waive the six months' residence rule in the cases of the British ladies and it is also announced that the tournament will be open to American competitors should any desire to take part, this action being in return for the kindness of the American clubs allowing Canadian competitors to try for their championship laurels.

Miss Dodds, Miss Harrison and Miss Ravenscroft are now on their way to Canada and will supply an additional feature for the Canadian championships, which will be decided over the links of the Royal Montreal Club at Dixie.
