STRESSES NEED OF NATIONAL SPIRIT

A. M. BELDING TELLS OF IDEAS GLEANED ON TRIP

Suggests Economic Gathering From All Parts of Canada

NEED FOR CHANGE Sees Necessity For Co-operation of Aims of Four Great Divisions of Country

MONTREAL, March 16.—Observations and inquiries made in a trans-Canada tour convinced A. M. Belding of the Saint John Times-Star that a true national spirit does not exist in Canada and he suggests that business men of the four great divisions convene to frame a suitable economic policy without regard to political exigencies.

"Real national spirit does not exist," Mr. Belding said. "The economic interests of the four great divisions are not the same and often clash. There is discontent in the west just as there is in the Maritime Provinces, and a common feeling that the Central Provinces have a little selfish."

"A new national economic policy must be framed in the spirit of give and take. Everywhere I went I found a genuine desire for such a change, as for instance, the western farmer with his support of free trade, and the eastern manufacturer with his desire for a high tariff."

MAN ACCUSED OF MURDER OF YOUTH Guardian Arrested in Case of 17-Year-Old Youth Found Shot Dead.

CHARGE AGAINST GUARDIAN A formal charge of willful murder was laid against the Guardian and he was remanded. Medical evidence given by the doctor who conducted the post-mortem, showed the boy's body to have been in a shocking condition, the feet inflamed, masses of sores from frost bite and both arms badly bruised. The boy was suffering from double pneumonia, and he would have died within five days.
