CINCINNATI TAKES MORNING TO REJOICE

Half Holiday is Welcome to World Champions

Man Says Sox Game But Outclassed—Gleason Says It Was Greatest Series and Believes His Team Best Club

Cincinnati, Ohio, Oct. 10.—Hilarious Cincinnati rose this morning to celebrate a "public holiday" from 8 o'clock till noon the triumphal return of the Reds from Chicago where they won the baseball championship of the world yesterday from the White Sox.

Joy was at flood tide last night, and while impromptu processions formed and marched through all sections of the city, representative men of affairs met at the Business Men's Club and appointed committees and made final arrangements for the "official celebration" of the homecoming of Manager Moran and his athletes.

Moran Happy Man.

Chicago, Oct. 10.—"The Reds are the champions and I am the happiest man in the world tonight," said Manager Pat Moran of the triumphant Cincinnati club last night. "I cannot praise my players too highly. They played remarkable ball, fought every minute to win and here never was a time when they lost confidence."

"Eller got himself in a couple of bad holes but he recovered quickly and had the Sox at his mercy. I want to say that the Sox are not quitters. They are a lot of players. They fought to win but were outclassed, in my opinion. The series ended as I thought it would. I must admit that the Sox gave us a scare."

"If Williams had shown some 'stuff' in the first inning it would have been a different story to tell tonight," said Manager Gleason of the Sox. "But he did not have a thing except a desire to beat the Reds. That first inning, when the Reds scored four runs, was enough to take the heart out of any ball club, but the Sox came back fighting."

"We were handicapped at the start of the series in pitching, but I was confident that we could pull through. The Reds were lucky to win these three games. However, they beat us in one of the greatest series ever staged, and I believe it is off to them. But I still believe the Sox is the better ball club."

AGAINST HANDLING LIQUOR IF OTHER SYSTEM WILL DO

Winnipeg, Oct. 10.—To dispense no liquor if it could be handled for medicinal purposes by any other system, to preserve the Canadian market for Canadian made goods, to accord to the returned soldier pharmaceutical graduate the most generous treatment, reciprocity of diplomats and to meet in Montreal in 1920, were among the resolutions of the afternoon session of the pharmaceutical convention yesterday.

J. E. Barnabe, Montreal, was chosen president.

KEITH ESTATE IS SUED FOR \$5,000,000

Boston, Oct. 10.—John P. Cronan, a Boston lawyer, has brought a second suit against the estate of the late Paul Keith for \$5,000,000 for services he says he rendered in preventing the late B. F. Keith from disinheriting his son, Paul. An earlier bill filed was one in equity. The present one is an action at law. Mr. Cronan alleges he made it possible for Paul Keith to succeed to his father's \$5,000,000 estate and that he did it on an oral agreement with Paul Keith and Edward A. Albee that he should have a one-third interest in the property if he succeeded in inducing the father to transfer his enterprises to the son and to Mr. Albee.

The declaration contains 246 items of service, including one of inducing B. F. Keith's widow to accept \$800,000 and not to contest her husband's will.

HIRE TEAM; FAIL TO RETURN

A horse and wagon, hired by two men on September 30, from the Brunswick Livery Stable, has not been returned and no trace of either the men or the rig has so far been found.
In the temporary absence of C. L. McFadden, of McFadden & Lund, proprietors of the livery, two men called several times that they wanted a team to go to the woods hunting. Percy McFadden, who had charge of the horses, asked the men who they were and got them to sign their names in the charge book. They wrote "Arthur Spang and Frank Card." There is a citizen of Sackville by the name of Frank Card, but McFadden, a stranger in town, was not acquainted with him.
A few days later the team not having been returned, Ralph Lund saw Mr. Card and asked him when he was going to return the team. It then came out that Mr. Card had not been at the livery with anyone and that no team had been secured by him or at his request.
The team consists of a roan mare, weighing about 900 pounds, with a white star on her forehead. The wagon has steel tires, piano box seat, and is painted black.

START WORK ON CITY HOUSES

Rourke & Griffiths Promise to Have Them Ready by May 1

Rourke & Griffiths, who have been awarded the contract for the erection of the city housing commission's dwellings in West St. John, have made a start on the work and promise to have all the houses ready for the occupants by May 1 of next year. Their contract calls for four self-contained cottages and eight semi-detached.

Plans are being made on this contract. Shingles have advanced \$1 a thousand in the last week, doors have gone up and other materials are showing the same tendency. The contractors discovered a peculiar situation when they started to purchase supplies and found there was not a single barrel or bag of cement for sale in the city. They have ordered a supply from Montreal and expect it here on Monday. The rough lumber required has been purchased through a local dealer from a place near Digby, N. S., and now is on the way here.

A prominent citizen, speaking today of the start made by the commission, said that if this effort is successful it should encourage private individuals to erect dwellings either for their own use or for rental. He said that he would be glad to build one himself just to aid in relieving the congestion.

WORKING WOMEN PLAN FOR WORLD CONGRESS

Washington, Oct. 10.—Invitations to attend the first International Congress of Working Women ever held have been called by the Woman's Trade Union League of America to thirty-four similar organizations throughout the world. The congress will be held here October 29-30, and it is said acceptances have been received from a considerable number of the organizations invited. Plans are being made on an unusual scale to entertain the delegates. It is expected 700 young women employed in the beginning of the strike. CORN HIGHER

Chicago, Oct. 10.—Rains and a forecast of falling frost led to higher prices today for corn, notwithstanding that the bulk of the crop everywhere has been harvested and the market is no longer from frost. Higher quotations on hogs counted somewhat as an additional element of strength. Buy, however, was not of an aggressive character. Opening prices, which ranged from 1-4 to 1-5 higher with December \$1.22-1/2 to \$1.24-1/4, and May \$1.22-3/8 to \$1.24-1/2, were followed by a slight reaction.
Oats hardened in value with corn. After opening a shade to 3-8 cent up, including December at 71-1/8 to 71-1/4, the market scored further gains. Provisions were firmer owing to upturn in the hog market. Trade, though, lacked volume.
