IMPORTANT CHANGES COMING IN CITY ACT

Several additions to properties exempt from municipal taxation in Saskatchewan cities are provided in a draft bill which has been printed as an amendment to the City act and which is being considered by the legislative assembly.

Income Tax

The bill proposes for the purpose of municipal income tax to differentiate between the single and married. The present law allows exemption of the first \$1,000 of income for all persons, but this is to be substituted by the following: "The income of every unmarried person up to \$1,000 and of every married person up to \$1,500."

TWO NEW RAILROAD LINES FOR SOUTHWEST SASKATCHEWAN

Applications are being made by the Canadian Pacific Railway company to the federal government for charters for the construction of two new lines in the southwest of Saskatchewan, notice of these applications appearing in the Canada Gazette.

One of the lines for which an application is being made is an extension from Wymark, south of Swift Current on the Vanguard line to a point south of Moose Jaw on the Expanse branch.

CONVENTION OF FIRE INSURANCE MEN FEBRUARY 13

An executive meeting of fire insurance men was held in the city recently for the purpose of making arrangements for a convention of fire insurance agents to be held in the city on February 13.

SOME FACTS ABOUT CONDITIONS IN GERMANY

A letter received by M. A. Eby from his son, Gunner Eby, who is now in Germany with the Canadian army, states that business is going on as usual in Cologne, theatres are open and the prices in the restaurants are much lower than in France.

RESTRICTIONS ON ALL CLASSES OF FOOD LICENSES WITHDRAWN

All restrictions on three classes of food licenses—retail dealers, wholesale grocers and public eating places—have been withdrawn by order of the Canada food board, it was announced a few days ago. They

may now return to pre-war conditions. Such dealers shall not be required to obtain licenses or renewals of same.

Order No. 63, which has been in force since September, fixing prices to be paid to fishermen for British Columbia salmon is likewise repealed.

The announcements add that all restrictions on bakers and confectioners have also been removed to take effect on February 10.

AUTOMOBILES IN PROVINCE INCREASING LARGELY

With returns not complete for the entire month, the number of new automobile licenses issued in January this year show a remarkable increase as compared with the figures for January, 1918.

Up to January 27, the motor license department of the provincial government with offices in the Farmers' building, had issued licenses for over 8,000 automobiles in the province. Of this number, 579 were taken out in Regina, 512 in Saskatoon and 271 in Moose Jaw.

RETURN FARES ON RAILWAYS GO UP

Effective on February 1, a new regulation will force travellers on all railways to pay more for their return tickets between local points on any line of railway in Canada.

The increase is approximately eight per cent, over the tariffs charged up to and including January 31, 1919.

In order to give an idea of the increase, the price of a ticket to Moose Jaw and return is as follows: Under the new regulation a passenger on any of the railways will have to pay \$2.60 and five cents special charge.

GASOLINE TRACTORS REMAIN ON FREE LIST

Gasoline farm tractors costing less than \$1,400 remain on the free list "until otherwise provided for." Meat cattle remain on the free list for another year, dating from February 7, 1919.

Both were originally placed on the free list for one year dating from February 7, 1918. By further orders in council, the period in which "Remission and refund of duty" are authorized is now extended as indicated.

An additional order has been passed, granting a drawback of ninety-nine per cent. of the duty paid on imported materials used after February 7, 1919, in the manufacture of gas or gasoline traction engines for farm purposes.

IMPERIAL OIL CO. FIRES ALL ALIENS

Mr. Moore, manager of the Imperial Oil Co., Regina, has announced to the executive of the veterans that he was prepared to dismiss all aliens as fast as they could be replaced by returned soldiers.

WAR MUSEUM FOR REGINA

Construction of the War Memorial museum for the province of Saskatchewan, which is to be built in the parliament buildings grounds in this city, will commence this year, it was announced by the Hon. A. P. McNab in the Saskatchewan assembly on Saturday, when the house was in committee of supply considering the estimates.

TWO LIVESTOCK CENTRES FOR SASKATCHEWAN

Moose Jaw and Prince Albert will be the two livestock centres to be financially assisted by the provincial government, according to an announcement made to a Regina daily paper by Premier Martin.

He said: "The government will assist Prince Albert and Moose Jaw to build stockyards, one being the centre for the north and the other for the south."

SINN FEINERS WERE JAILED FOR DRILLING

DUBLIN, Feb. 27. — Twelve Sinn Feiners were found guilty yesterday of illegal drilling in a private hall and were sentenced to six months' imprisonment.

When arraigned they denied the authority of British laws and one of them, while in the dock, waved a republican flag.

A labor congress has been summoned for next week to meet in the Mansion House here to demand a universal 44-hour week at wages 150 per cent. above pre-war rates, with a minimum of 50 shillings weekly for all workers.

GERMANY READY FOR A BATTLE WITH POLES

BERLIN, Jan. 29. — German military preparations have been completed and a great offensive against the invading Poles may soon be expected, it was announced today. More than 20,000 volunteers left for the "eastern front" yesterday.

Polish forces are nearing the border of the province of Brandenburg. The Volksrat of Bromberg has protested against further negotiations with the Poles, declaring the latter will not keep any agreements and only want to gain time for strong military measures.

J. A. MAHARG ON WAY HOME

A cablegram was received at the office of the Grain Growers' Association saying that J. A. Maharg, M.P., president of the association, had sailed from England en route to Canada. He is expected back in Regina in time to preside at the big annual convention next month.

(Continued from Page 1.) provision for a closed season for elk and also to extend the time for the complete protection of prairie chicken and partridge indefinitely.

Withdraw Extra Supplementary Tax

The bill providing for a supplementary revenue tax of four cents an acre on all land within the organized areas of the province, but outside school districts for educational purposes has been withdrawn and will not be dealt with this year.

The efforts which have been prosecuted during the past few years to discover and test a reliable water finding instrument for general use in the province are outlined in a return which was tabled in the legislative assembly Tuesday in response to a request proffered a few days ago by H. E. Jones, Tisdale.

The return also shows that during the period from 1912 to the present time the government has expended a total sum of \$106,665 for the construction and repair of dugouts, reservoirs and dams used for the purpose of securing a water supply.

In 1912 it was brought to the attention of the department of public works that a magnetic water finder was being used with success by the Indian government. One of these machines was secured, but as the result of a test boring made at Pense, no supply of water was secured.

This, coupled with information received from various sources of a very contradictory nature, has not enabled the department to come to any conclusion as to the efficiency or otherwise of water finding instruments.

Provision to Seize Chattels

Provision to seize the goods of defaulters under the School Attendance Act, where the defaulters prefer to go to jail rather than pay the fine, is provided in a bill which was considered in committee and finally passed by the Saskatchewan assembly Friday.

The bill is designed to deal with a situation which has arisen among the Mennonite communities.

1,800 Prosecutions

Premier Martin in introducing the amendments stated that from the time the bill went into force in the latter part of 1917 up to November last not less than 1,800 prosecutions had been brought under the School Attendance Act and quoted the fact that in the latter part of 1917 there were 13,000 more children between the ages of 7 and 14 in attendance in the public schools of the province than in 1916 as an indication of the salutary effect of the measure.

A peculiar situation had arisen, however, in the enforcement of the act in connection with schools adjoining the two Mennonite settlements in the province. The parents in these districts had declined to send their children to school and when convicted had elected to go to jail rather than pay the fine.

Rather than permit these people to continue this form of apparent martyrdom the bill was designed to enable the law to satisfy the fines by way of seizure of the goods and chattels of those who should be convicted.

Seed Grain Relief

A bill conferring upon the Saskatchewan Farm Loans board the same powers to provide advances for seed grain relief as are granted private mortgage companies in the act which was passed recently in the Saskatchewan legislature, was passed.

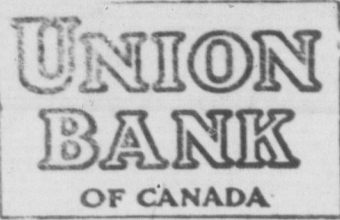
Dodging of Taxation

In considering the bill to amend the Wild Lands Tax act, the Hon. Geo. Langley said the government had been up against deliberate attempts to dodge the payment of this tax on the part of some landowners, and for this reason an amendment was inserted providing that fencible land used for pasturage purposes, to be exempt, must provide for pasturing of at least one horse or head of cattle or three sheep for every ten acres.

These animals must be the property of the owner or tenant of the land or must be in charge of the owner or tenant.

Lands held under homestead or pre-emption entry, for which patent has not been issued or recommended and land which for any reason is wholly unfit for cultivation, will in future be exempt from the provisions of the act.

A further amendment was added, defining the class of fence which must be used to enable hay

GETTING TOWARDS NORMAL

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2.—Removal of all restrictions on margins of profits on foodstuffs, except cotton seed products and eggs, and cancellation of most license requirements on importers and distributors, effective tomorrow, were announced today by the food administration on authority of a proclamation signed by President Wilson in Paris.

BOLSHEVIKI VICTORY

ARCHANGEL, Feb. 1. — Another violent attack by the Bolsheviks on the American, Russian and British positions at Tarosovo compelled the hard pressed and outnumbered little column in this sector to withdraw yesterday approximately 40 miles. The new position is at the village of Skrdmakenga.

BOLSHEVIKS AT BREST LITOVSK

LONDON, Jan. 31. — The Polish information committee learns that the Germans have transferred control of Brest-Litovsk from the Ukrainians and the Bolsheviks are expected to arrive in that town within a few days.

SHELL PETROGRAD FROM KRONSTADT, KILLING MANY

STOCKHOLM, Feb. 2. — Petrograd has been bombarded by Kronstadt artillery and many people have been killed, according to travellers who are quoted by this effect by the Finnish papers. Serious disorders are prevalent in the Russian capital.

WANT FINLAND A NATION

PARIS, Jan. 29. — The French government, according to the Journal, has proposed to the powers that Finland be recognized as an independent nation.

GERMANS WILL SEIZE LAND

COPENHAGEN, Jan. 31. — A bill will be introduced in the German national assembly providing for the confiscation of a tenth part of the largest estates bought by war profiteers, or estates which have changed hands several times in the past twenty years, according to Berlin advices. This action is taken so that returning soldiers may acquire land holdings.

LUEDENDORFF RETURNS TO BERLIN

LONDON, Jan. 29. — General Ludendorff, former chief quartermaster-general of the German army, has returned to Berlin and is living in a small villa in the Gruenevald district under an assumed name, according to an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Amsterdam, because he fears hostile demonstrations. The general is said to have placed his services at the disposal of the government, which, it is added, declined them with thanks.
