A MORAL FROM FRANCE.

Contrast Between the Make-Up of the French Chamber of Deputies and the British Commons. The French Parliament is not what it was during the first decade of the third republic. There has been in its members a decline in political capacity, debating power and representative character. When general elections take place, there is intense interest in public affairs, but small politicians force their way into prominence as candidates, and are chosen by universal suffrage. The Chamber of Deputies does not, therefore, adequately represent the country and consequently does not command its respect. The British House of Commons is in touch with a wide range of public interests. There are now among its members fewer orators and fluent debaters than in the days of its greatest glory. The House has seldom had a higher average of character and ability. Among its members are titled landholders, millionaires and bankers, merchants and manufacturers, ship-builders and ship-owners, miners, retired officers of the military and naval services, lawyers and men of letters, workmen and agriculturists. In the French Chamber of Deputies there are few manufacturers, merchants and agriculturists, and highly educated men. The majority of the members are journalists, and excited talkers, who possess neither the mental qualities essential in a legislator, nor the necessary acquaintance with the details of public affairs. Denmark's Child Criminals.

Denmark is said to be the only country in the civilized world where houses of correction do not exist. In some of the provincial towns child criminals are put into a penitentiary at hard labor. In these towns the Judge has not even the privilege of mercy without the consent of the Attorney General. In Copenhagen, however, the Magistrate may discharge a child with a reprimand should he be disposed. Criminal records of Denmark show that from 1885 to 1893 there were 1,319 trials, against 2,182 children. Out of this number 2,068 were boys and 64 girls. Of these 1,871 boys and 41 girls were discharged with a reprimand, while 230 boys were sent to the penitentiary and three girls and seven boys were sentenced to prison.
