An Electrically Charged Pool in the Street Killed Several People.

PITTSBUIRG, Fa., July S.-During the progress of a terrific rain storm today four persons were killed in an accident of most unusual character. The dead are: Joseph Wiss, Guiseppe Renda, aged 21 years; Mrs. Frances-ca Statt, aged 54; Guiseppi Statt, her sevent Wise were of the same family. A large American flag susp-inded from a grocery store at Forbes and Oakland Ave. became soaked with the rain, and the high wind blew it against an electric light wire which was carry-ing 200 volts. The wire snapped under the reasure and fell into the street, one and lodging in a pool of water. 
THE WEST INDIA LINE.
