In a good old fashioned slugger match yesterday the Roses stopped the Alberts' winning streak and once more forged to the lead in the series. The out-landers did a regular land office business, according to everything that came their way. Taylor led with six put outs. Pidda followed with five and Tibbets with four. McFarlane pulled down three and Hayes one, for a total of 18. Tibbets made a couple of very pretty catches, but the honors fell to Pidda, who made a wonderful one hand running catch of a line off Tibbets' bat that was ticked for three cushions at least. One old time ball player remarked that it was the greatest catch he ever saw on the Victoria grounds.

As anticipated, it was a slugger match pure and simple, and the Roses came out on top, making fourteen hits off McDermott, while the Alberts got ten off Willis. Priests got three, two singles and a drive over the right field fence. Britt also made a circuit of the bases in a line drive into the corner by the club house. Taylor and Hayes had three each and Tibbets and Howe doubles. Both pitchers were a little wild, each handing out six walks. Several of which were cashed in at the plate.

CAPE BRETON MORALS.

SYDNEY, C. B., July 8.—The arrest at Moncton today of W. H. Willard of this town on the charge of abduction, has caused some interest among the sporting fraternity. The charge for which Willard is held is that he abducted a young woman named Ethel McCarthy, who comes from a very respectable family. She is under 16 years and a pupil at the Convent schools. Willard is alleged to have bought a ticket at Sydney station yesterday for Moncton, checking his travelling trunk at the same time. The girl did not accompany him from Sydney, but is said to have crossed to North Sydney, taking the train there and joining him later on the road. Last night a telegram was received from the young lady at Sydney stating she was going on to Halifax to be married. The law was set in motion today by Crown Prosecutor Hearn with the result that the pair were intercepted at Moncton, where they were passing themselves off as man and wife. Willard has been here for two or three years, but followed no set vocation as far as known. He has a wife and family, but their whereabouts at present are not known. They were here with him last year. Willard originally belonged to St. John, and at one time did business in Halifax. Provincial Constable MacDonald leaves for Moncton tomorrow and will bring the couple back to Sydney. If they were married, Willard will likely be prosecuted for bigamy.

SOME WONDERFUL CURES.

The members of First Church of Christ, Scientist, of St. John met last evening in their room in Oddfellows hall, and the delegates who had attended the convention of Christian Scientists in London delivered reports. Mrs. McAfee, the first reader of the church, presided, and among those who took part in the meeting were visitors from Boston and Philadelphia.

Several of those who had attended the convention in Boston had been invalids previously, but some very remarkable cures were reported by the delegates. One woman through her abiding faith in the healing powers of the Almighty, had been completely cured of a severe attack of paralysis. Another had recovered from a long standing case of curvature of the spine. Many other instances of cures equally remarkable as the above were told of by those present.

The delegates said that the reports of the convention in Boston were encouraging. The sect is increasing rapidly in numbers, especially in the United States.

The Christian Scientists in this city meet every Wednesday evening for their regular testimonial meeting, in Oddfellows hall, and also on Sunday they have their regular services at 11 a. m. and 7 p. m. All these meetings are open to the public, who are cordially invited to attend.

SUMMER SCHOOL.

The summer school for Sunday school teachers and Christian workers generally under the auspices of the Presbytery of St. John will open in St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church on July 12nd and continue to the 15th.

Prof. Geo. W. Pease will deliver ten lectures on matters relating to Sabbath school work. Rev. Dr. Falconer of Halifax will give five lectures on the "Life of Christ." Other lecturers will be Dr. Fraser, Dr. Morrison and many others. There will be morning and evening sessions.

HORSE SHOW AND CARNIVAL.
These events will take place on the 6th, 7th, 8th and 9th of October. The first two days will be devoted to the horse show, and the latter two days to athletic and aquatic sports.

The committee having this matter in hand met in the Board of Trade room last evening, and much discussion took place. The programme was partially arranged and a portion of it given to the printer.

A REMARKABLE ELECTRIC FATALITY.

An Electrically Charged Pool in the Street Killed Several People.

PITTSBURGH, Pa., July 8.—During the progress of a terrific rain storm today four persons were killed in an accident of most unusual character. The dead are: Joseph Wise, Giuseppe Renda, aged 21 years; Mrs. Francesca Statti, aged 54; Giuseppe Statti, her son, aged 22. All of the victims except Wise were of the same family.

A large American flag suspended from a grocery store at Forbes and Oakland Ave. became soaked with the rain, and the high wind blew it against an electric light wire which was carrying 200 volts. The wire snapped under the pressure, and fell on the street, one end lodging in a pool of water.

The first one to fall a victim to the wire was Wise, who was running for shelter from the rain. In crossing the street, he stepped into the pool, and fell like one shot. His death was instantaneous.

Shortly after this the Statti family came driving along the street in a surrey. As they approached the broken wire hundreds of people tried to warn them of danger, but could not make themselves understood until too late. The driver tried to pull away from the wire, but one of the horses stepped into the highly charged pool of water, and fell paralyzed. The occupants of the surrey immediately began to jump, and the four who leaped from the side opposite to the wire escaped injury. But the three on the other side in their excitement fell on the wire, and were shocked to death almost instantly.

None of the large crowd who witnessed the accident could approach the victims until the current was shut off from the wire, and for quite a while they lay on the street unattended.
