

BERLIN, March 16.—A remarkable sermon was preached by Dr. Faber, the court chaplain, in the chapel of the Imperial Palage at the usual service heid before the opening of the Reichstag by the Kaiser.

Dr. Faber said the Reichstag ought to consist entirely of loyal Deputies who are willing to follow the Kaiser with perfect faith, without doubt and without questioning. He continued:—
"If we had such a Reichstag, we could safely leave the control of our destinies to God and the Kaiser."

"The victory of the Imperialistic parties at the recent general election was a work of Divine Providence, and all the world heard the voice of God revealed in the result of the polls. God has taken Germany under His especial protection, and the German people are destined by Divine Providence to be the salt of the earth and the representatives of refligion among mankind."

Harrowing Tales From the Districts in

ST. PETERSBURG, March 16.—Harrowing accounts continue to be published of the terrible distress prevailing in the districts affected by the

ing in the districts affected by the famine.

A letter from a rural judge in the district of Menselinsk, Government of Ufa, depicts the suffering of which he is an eyewitness. He says that, owing to its scarcity, the supply of rye flour has now frequently to be mixed with acorn meal, and that even the latter is difficult to obtain. A crowd of hungry people is besieging the Judge from morning until night at his official residence, and similar scenes may be witnessed at the offices of the communal authorities. Some of these people are actually forcing their way into his apartments begging for or demanding food. There have been cases of children being brought into his office by parents, who said to him: "Feed them yourself, we do not want them to die before our eyes."

The Judge, in his letter, makes a fervent appeal to the kind donors in Perm, Petersburg, Odessa, Helsingfors, Kieff, Minsk and other places, who, in the famine years 1897-1898, did such noble work for the Tartars and Russians of his district, and expresses surprise that their assistance should be failing him on the present occasion.

Advices from Kazan show that owing to the famine, hungry parents continue selling their daughters. In the district of Tejusha a 19-year-old girl, named Chasifa, of the village of Dantshevo, has been sold for 100 rubles, and other cases are cited in which young girls have been disposed of for smaller sums. There is scarcely a village in that districe in which scurvy has not made its arpearance.
