Says Liquor Men Have More Weight With Its Members Than the Church of God—Belleves St. John Merchants FIGHT STAMPEDES Pay Scott Act Fines of Convicted Moncton Dealers Whom They Supply With Liquor

Nichols stated that the liquor problem was the most important question now before the church. The liquor traffic is known to be a hindrance to the work of the church and therefore this stumbling block must be removed. The saloon will destroy the church if it can and the church will destroy the saloon. When an assembly passes resolutions against the liquor traffic, said the professor, it doesn't do much good. The practical man who is not one of those who attended the assembly, wants to see what the church is actually doing and not what its feeling is, as expressed in resolutions.

The law which the church wishes to enforce is not to forbid a man from drinking, but to prevent liquor being sold. No man is forbidden to eat diseased meat, but the law does not permit him to sell it.

"It will be a long, hard fight," said Prof. Nichols, "but in time we hope to remove that great stumbling block to the Church of God."
