HOPEWELL CAPE, Sept. 17.—The third trial of Thomas Collins was begun here today at eleven o'clock. Judge Hamilton presiding. Solicitor General Jones appeared on behalf of the Crown. H. A. McKeown and C. Sherren on behalf of the prisoner. Out of the 121 jurors empanelled, 106 were present. The work of choosing the twelve men to try the case was proceeded with. Out of the eight men examined up to noon only one was chosen. He is Sherman Martin, a farmer. The other men were challenged for cause by Mr. McKeown. The Crown prosecutor examined the men thoroughly on their belief and sentiment in regard to capital punishment.

It is hardly likely the jury will be completed today.
