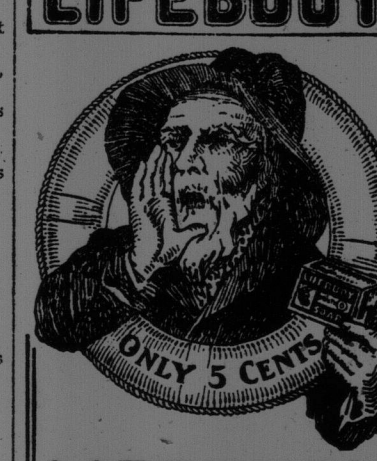

### FIVE LIE DEAD AS THE RESULT OF RACE RIOT

### Tampa the Scene of a Bloody Warfare Between Blacks and Whites.

TAMPA, Fla., March 7.—With three negroes dead as a result of a race riot in the neighborhood of Palmetto yesterday, the wrath of the residents in that section seems to be assuaged. The total deaths is three negroes and two white men, with one white man in the emergency hospital here with a bullet hole through his head.

Sam Ellis, one of two negro brothers, charged with the responsibility of the trouble, was killed by bullets by a posse today, after he and his brother, Wade Ellis, had mortally wounded Deputy Sheriff J. B. Morgan and seriously wounded Deputy Max Burnett.

Wade Ellis was lynched this afternoon. He had fallen asleep and when he awoke he was lying in the hands of a dozen guns. He reached for his rifle and, in a second, he was killed by bullets.
