New York, March 1.—Br. steamer Irishbrook reports Jan. 30, lat 41 N, lon 57 W, during a hurricane the deck of about 200 pieces of saw timber, from 16 to 56 feet long and from 8 to 12 inches square, was washed overboard.  
Gloucester, Feb. 28.—Schr Sylvia M. Numan, Boston for an Eastern port for ball, was run down by schr Grayling on her way from Portland to

#### Island. The Numan sank in two minutes; all hands saved.

Bermuda, Feb. 28.—Schr J. C. Strawbridge, Avey, from Rackland, Feb. 16 for Nassau, with ice, foundered at sea. Crew landed here by ship Eshymon (Rus.), from Gulfport for Rio Janeiro. The Strawbridge sprung a leak Feb. 25 when 230 miles from Bermuda and sank shortly afterward. She was built at Camden, Me., in 1901, and was owned by the Coastwise Transportation Co. of Boston. The vessel was of 758 tons net burden, valued at \$30,000 and was insured.

#### SHIPPING NOTES.

Steamship Manchester Engineer, now on her way to Manchester, took away a cargo valued as follows:—Canadian goods \$57,188; Foreign goods, \$82,095; Total \$139,283. She has 16,300 bushels of wheat, 367,717 feet of spruce deals, and 11,335 packages of United States lard.

Manifests for 66 cars of United States goods were received at the Custom House yesterday, the products consisting of meats, lard, lumber, &c. A large amount of United States freight is passing through the port this season, more so than ever before.

When the Ocano leaves port tonight for Demerara, West Indies, and Demerara, she will be minus fourteen former members of her crew, as they have been detained at the Quarantine Hospital at Lawlor's Island. The Ocano has been thoroughly fumigated since the last trip, during which a number of the crew contracted smallpox. Fourteen new seamen have been engaged and will sail tonight. ### OFFICERS FOR 28TH DRAGONS

New Cavalry Regiment Divided into Four Squadrons With One Having Headquarters in St. John.

The organization of the 28th New Brunswick Dragoons, the new cavalry regiment, composed of men from Queens, Sunbury, York, Charlotte and St. John counties, has been authorized under general orders of the militia department, issued March 1. The gazing of the officers will appear in a draft gazette, early this month, to take effect from the date of the organization.

The regimental headquarters will be in this city and there will be four squadrons, divided as follows:  
A Squadron, with headquarters at Oromocto.  
B Squadron, with headquarters at Gagetown.  
C Squadron, with headquarters at Fredericton.  
D Squadron, with headquarters at St. John.

The latter squadron will be composed of two troops from St. John county and two troops from Charlotte county.  
The uniforms will be very showy, including a tunic of scarlet with facings of yellow.

New Regulations.  
Mr. George Robertson, Deputy Receiver-General and manager of the Savings Bank, has word from Ottawa of new regulations. Number of patients attending dispensary Feb. 1st, 32—adults 14 children, 18.  
New cases during the month, 8—adults 7, children 1.  
Number of visits to dispensary by all patients, 37—adults 22 visits, children 15 visits.  
Number of days dispensary was open, 12 days for 2 hours or more each day—16 hours being given to adults and 8 hours to children.  
Number of discharges, 6—adults 3, children 3.  
Reasons for discharge: 2 not tubercular; 1 died; 1 admitted to Home for Incurables; 1 referred to O. P. D. of General Public Hospital.  
Conditions of these patients on discharge: 3 improved, 2 unimproved.  
Nurse's visits: In homes, 51; of cooperation, 23.  
Several donations of eggs and warm clothing left at dispensary have been utilized.

### HEAVY SENTENCES FOR MULLEN'S SLAYERS

Cambridge, Mass., Mar. 2.—For the murder of Miss Annie Mullens, of St. John's, Nfld., in Arlington on Mar. 28, 1908, James Mantler, of Manchester, N. H., was sentenced to state prison for life, and his companion, Peter Delorey, of Somerville, for a term of 18 to 20 years, by the Middlesex superior court today. In 1909, Mantler was convicted of second degree murder, and Delorey of manslaughter. Exceptions taken by the counsel were recently overruled. Delorey is a native of Antigonish, N. S.
