British Headquarters, France---It is now possible, from the narra-tives of participants, to construct some picture of the skriy stage of the fighting on the Ypres salient, which, it will be remembered, began on Friday, the 2nd inst., with an attack by the enemy on about 3,000 yards of our front line before Zillebeks, from a point a little south of Ards of our front line before 2 licebeke, from a point a little south of deege to a point to the north of Hill 60. The affair commenced with an extraordinarily intense bombardment, opened at about 8.30 in the morning. The first infantry attacks were delivered about an hour after 100n, and the artillery and infantry fighting continued until after 11 Yelock at night. By the close of the day the enemy had captured our front line over practically the whole area attacked, and had penetrated into our position to a depth at one point of some 700 yards. On our


