The other Friday night the writer was an uninvited guest at a choir practice. The choir was an average one in more ways than one. There were about thirty-five members out, too few men, and they were not called to attention until almost fifteen minutes past the hour. It was not an average choir in that the leader gave his singers more training in return for their attendance than is usually the case and the class of music they were studying was above what would probably be considered the average level. At least four of Tertius Noble's anthems, were noticed in their repertoure.

Each one entered into the drill so enthusiastically that it was 10.10 before anyone was aware of the time.
