

Secretary of State Colby Sends

Gt: Britain Long Document Outlining U: S. View.

MESOPOTAMIAN OIL FIELDS THE TROUBLE

America Refuses to Go to League Meetings But Insists Upon Knowing All Business

Washington; Nov: 25 .- The Government of the United States has in-ormed Great Britain that it does not propose to be excluded from partici-pation in the rights and privileges se-cured under mandates provided in the tractiest of peace. Furthermore, it ex-pects to be heard regarding the terms of those mandates before they are put in force. The position of the United States is set forth in a note by Secretary of State Colby to Earl Ourson, the Brit-bias Secretary of State for Foreign Ar-tairs, and the specific question dis-cussed is that of the Mesopotamian pet-roleum fields. copose to be excluded from partici

A Reply to British

Mr. Colby's note is dated November 50, and was made public today, follow-ing its delivery to the British Foreign Office early this week. It is in reply to a British note of August 9 inst, which had never been made public, and which deals with the application of the principles of equality of treat-ment to the territories of the Near East to be placed under British man-date.
