WHO SAID

"We Germans fear God and nothing else in the world."

This is the confident assertion of Prince Otto von Bismarck, the German chancellor who is credited with having evolved the celebrated "blood and iron" policy of Prussia which resulted in war with France and was successful in unifying the various German states into the German Empire. To the policy of Bismarck may be traced the growth of the German spirit which led up to the World War. Militarism and an intense love for the "Fatherland" were instilled in the heart of every schoolboy, and the belief that there was nothing on earth "to fear," except God, led the patriotic German to back his government to the last ditch—even when that government, his head turned with the prospect it had achieved, led the nation into the most disastrous war of history. Bismarck was born of a noble family, April 1, 1815. He entered the army while a young man and soon became a Lieutenant in the Landwehr. After a brief interval, during which he looked after his estates and served as

Inspector of dikes, he became (in 1846) a member of the diet of Saxony and later a member of the diet of Prussia. In the year 1851 Bismarck's career as the unifier of Germany may be said to have begun. In that year he was appointed the representative of Prussia in the German Federation at Frankfurt. At that time he evinced a desire to see Germany strong and united and he devoted his efforts to checking Austria in her dreams of aggrandizement. From 1859 to 1862 Bismarck served as ambassador at St. Petersburg, Russia, and in the latter year, after a five months term as the German ambassador at Paris, he was named first minister of the Prussian crown. Bismarck now set about reorganizing the army, and when the assembly refused to pass his bill he repeatedly dissolved it until he had his way in the matter. Bismarck held office until 1890 when, following a disagreement with the Kaiser, he tendered his resignation. He died July 30, 1898.

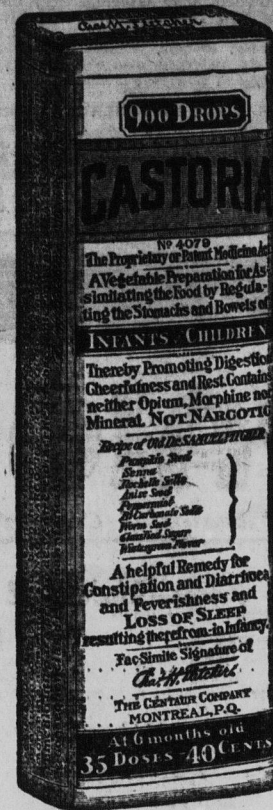
C. N. R. TIME CHANGES EFFECTIVE JUNE 26TH
