Coburg and Gotha.

Coburg, Aug. 4—Emperor William arrived here at 11.30 to attend the funeral of the late Duke of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha. He was given an ovation by dense crowds along the route. As soon as the Emperor arrived at the castle, the funeral cortege was formed. The Emperor walked in the first rank, between Duke Charles Edward and the Prince Regent. The Prince of Wales between the Grand Duke of Hesse and King Ferdinand of Romania followed. Then came the Duke of Connaught, the Duke of York and an endless procession of princes and dukes, representatives of German and foreign sovereigns and courts, naval and military deputations and officers of the Ducal court. The cortege, entering St. Meritz's church, took up places in the chancel, which had been converted into a veritable forest of palm trees. The church was draped in black, with hangings of embroidered crimson. The gloom was relieved at intervals by green pine sprays and silver fringes and the draped pillars were entwined with fresh garlands. From the organ loft a black velvet curtain was suspended, with the arms and initials of the dead Duke embroidered upon it in silver. The wreath sent by the dead duke's mother, Queen Victoria, which was placed at the head of the coffin, was composed of scarlet geraniums, white stocks and heliotrope in the scheme of the national colors and bore the simple and pathetic inscription: "From his sorrowing mother." At the front of the coffin lay an immense wreath of oak leaves inscribed: "From his three sisters."

The most striking feature among the many beautiful floral pieces was an immense anchor of white flowers entwined with a cable of corn flowers, inscribed: "The British navy mourns its gifted admiral."

Among the wreaths were displayed the Duke's orders and decorations. At the close of the simple funeral service the troops fired salutes from the castle square, after which the cortege returned to the castle.

During the service the hereditary prince of Saxe-Meiningen was taken ill and had to be carried to the chaplain's house. He soon recovered.

Emperor William paid a visit of condolence to the widow of the Duke of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha this afternoon and then left for Wilhelmshoe. At 10 o'clock tonight the remains of the Duke will be taken by torchlight, with an escort of princes, to the mausoleum in the church yard and placed in a vault.

Gagetown, Aug. 4—(Special)—A convention of the Conservatives of Queens county was held at Temperance Hall, Gagetown, today. Thomas H. Gilbert, of Gagetown, president of the Liberal-Conservative Association of Queens county, acted as chairman, and on the platform were Mr. G. E. Foster, M. P.; Mr. J. D. Hazen, M. P.; Dr. A. A. Stockton, R. D. Wilnot, of Sunbury; H. D. Hetherington, of Queens; Henry Wood, of Westford. R. H. Scovil was appointed secretary of the county. There were about a hundred delegates from the various parishes.

The chairman announced in opening the object was to choose a candidate to oppose Hon. L. P. Farris, in case he should accept the position of minister of agriculture.

Mr. A. D. Hazen in a speech suggested the convention had better get down to business.

Mr. Henry Wood, of Westford, moved that it was the desire of the convention to oppose Mr. Farris if he should seek election as minister of agriculture. Mr. Wood waived any claim he might have to the nomination and he nominated H. G. Hetherington in recognition, he said, of the work Mr. Hetherington has done in the county.

Mr. Scovil nominated Mr. Wood, who declined to accept and Mr. Scovil withdrew the nomination.

The nomination of Mr. Hetherington was then made unanimous.

Mr. Hetherington responded to a call for a speech. He claimed Mr. Farris should not be supported because he is a government member. He said Mr. Farris had not upheld the dignity of a government member and attacked him on the ground that he had interfered with the municipal council and the road commissioners "to make way for his own pet."

He also claimed that the government had taken \$80,000 from the people to give a job to Flood, of St. John, in changing and supplying new text books for the schools.

Dr. Stockton was the next speaker, and during his speech he referred to the fact that Mr. G. E. Foster had been tendered the nomination for Queens and Sunbury for the dominion house.

R. D. Wilnot, of Sunbury, presided for Queens. He said this election was a feeler.

Mr. Foster spoke against the local government, claiming that many accounts had been taken to the widow of the Duke of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha. To Pierce the Isthmus Without Delay—Has the Capital.

New York, Aug. 3—John D. Crimmins, of the Syndicate formed to construct an interoceanic canal through Nicaragua under the concession given by the government of Nicaragua to Edward Erre and Edward F. Cragin, the existence of which was proclaimed yesterday by President Zelaya, said today the company would proceed to carry out the terms of its contract without delay. The capital needed has been secured, and if the estimate of cost made for this government is correct, the canal can be built for the same money and probably less. This estimate is about \$130,000,000.

Determined to Suicide.

Rockland, Me., Aug. 5—John Whitney, 40 years old, who lives in Rockport, committed suicide at an early hour today by drowning. The act was due to insanity from which the deceased had suffered for some time. This was not his first attempt to take his own life, for only a few days ago he cut his throat with a razor.

A Million Dollar Fire In Ashland.

Ashland, Wis., Aug. 4—A round million dollars worth of property was destroyed by fire in the lumber district of this city today. The flames were checked after three hours' struggle and before they reached the valuable saw mill and docks along the water front.

At 1.30 p. m. the fire was discovered in the lumber yards of Barker, Street & Stewart. It spread rapidly to the Keystone Lumber Company's yards and in a short time had destroyed almost fifty million feet of lumber, including saw timbers. Carried by the strong wind, the fire brands started a blaze in the lime, salt and cement dock, one-quarter of a mile away. The dock burned like a pile of straw and a mile long and was soon reduced to ruins, together with a warehouse containing thousands of dollars worth of merchandise and several miles of railroad track.

Four thousand pounds of dynamite was brought to the scene and distributed all round the outer edge of the fire zone. Piles of lumber and scores of small buildings were blown into atoms and after three hours' hard work the flames had apparently reached their limit. None of the great saw mills had been destroyed, but the loss was a million dollars. Edward Hines said that the loss of his firm alone was \$800,000, fully insured.

At 8 o'clock this evening the wind, which had steadily favored the fire fighters, suddenly veered toward the city and developed into a gale. The alarm was sounded again and every available piece of fire apparatus was brought into action, but it appeared probable that the mill of Barker, Street & Stewart, Duane's mill, the Ashland Iron and Steel Company's property and the Ohio Coal Company's dock would be destroyed.

At 9 o'clock, when it seemed as if the whole city was in the greatest danger, the wind suddenly veered again toward the bay and away from the city and the mills. Meanwhile the fire was slowly eating toward the remaining lumber piles toward the Keystone mill. Several miles of lumber burned during the evening, but at 10 o'clock the fire had been checked, except in the vicinity of the Keystone mill. It is reported that the fire department was called out to the mill, but it never been called out.

The Emperor's Talk Embarrasses His Statesmen—Another Large Body of Troops.

Berlin, Aug. 4—In official circles here it is stated that the policy regarding China between the Emperor and the minister of foreign affairs, Count Von Buelow, the latter being aware that Germany's aim at obtaining suitable satisfaction in China are seriously hampered by their Emperor's impulsive utterances. It is further stated that the Emperor has already passed between the Emperor and Count Von Buelow on this subject.

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A Sermon at Newport on Sunday Golf and Whist.

Newport, R. I., Aug. 5—Sunday, golf, and the favorite diversion among the summer colony, which few stakes were denounced, and the fashionable people who play them were severely arraigned by Rev. Braddon Hamilton of New York, in his sermon at All Saints chapel this morning. The congregation, as it does every Sunday during summer, represented the most exclusive social circle of the country, and the rev. doctor's words became the theme of much comment later in the day.

In part Dr. Hamilton said: "On account of important position in several ways in which Newport holds in the eyes of the people of this country, your life here is of great importance, not only for your own sake, but because of your influence on the 75,000,000 people who are looking to you for example, for precedent. If the people here introduce a certain idea this year, before two years, fifty million out of the seventy million of our people in this country will try and work out that idea in their own way, in their own different spheres. You are responsible to God, and the people of this country for a great deal of good and a great deal of harm. For example, if you establish the idea that a lavish, unnecessary, thoughtless expenditure of money is the great object of the American citizen's ambitions, many a good man will go to prison trying to furnish his wife with funds while she is trying to imitate the example."

"Show the people of this country that the boastful, vulgar, brainless spendthrift is not the ideal citizen of this country, but that the cultivated Christian gentleman living comfortably on what he has come by honestly and surrounded by every comfort or luxury he can afford, that he is the ideal citizen. There are a good many people in our land who might be excused in a sense if they spend Sunday in recreation and amusements, on account of their employment during the week, but the people of Newport have no such excuse, and the young man or young woman who will desert church on Sunday morning and go and play golf, who has six days a week, have very little respect for themselves and far less for the community which they are leading in the wrong."

Death of Right Rev. James Augustine Healey.

Portland, Me., Aug. 5—Right Rev. James Augustine Healey, bishop of the Roman Catholic diocese of Maine, died at his episcopal residence on Congress street at 1 o'clock this afternoon. Bishop Healey returned from Canada Friday night, where he had been on Episcopal business, and seemed to be in his usual health, though for many years he has been subject to frequent attacks of acute indigestion. Saturday he went to Bedford on ecclesiastical affairs, returning some about 5 o'clock. At 9 o'clock he complained of indigestion and suffered for about two hours, finally getting relief through the attendance of Doctors Baker and McLaughlin. He slept well during the night and tried to get up this morning to say mass, but was unable to do so. The depression returned from which he was temporarily relieved but at 12 o'clock he began to grow weaker, so much so that at 12.30 he called for Father O'Brien, rector of the cathedral parish, who administered the last sacraments.

Bishop Healey continued in good spirits and was conscious to the last. No arrangements have yet been made for the funeral but announcement of the details will be given to the public in due time.

Right Rev. James Augustine Healey, Catholic bishop of Maine, was born at Mason, Ga., Aug. 6, 1838. In early life he turned his attention to civil engineering and served as an assistant engineer. He was later in the Maine State Police, and in 1864 entered Holy Cross College at Worcester, Mass., graduating in 1869 at the head of his class. His degree was taken under the Georgetown charter. He studied theology at the Grand Seminary at Montreal for three years and then went to Paris and continued his studies at St. Sulpice. June 10, 1864, he was ordained a priest in the cathedral of Notre Dame by Archbishop Desjardins. Prior to his ordination he had been designated by Bishop Piquet of Boston as his secretary, and he assumed the duties of that office as soon as he returned to America.

He was soon after appointed chancellor of the diocese of Boston, being the first to hold that office. He was also for some time rector of the cathedral, and was given extraordinary power as an administrator. His great success in business ability was recognized even then. For 12 years he discharged the duties of two and at times three important positions, a remarkable fact, when his always feeble health is taken into consideration.

From his first field of labor he passed, on the elevation of Bishop Williams to the episcopate, to the bishopric of St. James, Maine, where he served for 12 years. He held this position 12 years, where he made for himself a high and wide reputation as an eloquent speaker and delivered many orations and sermons on special occasions. Bishop Healey was an instrument in the establishment of many institutions connected with the church while he was the rector of St. James.

Bishop Bacon, the first bishop of Maine, died in 1871 and Bishop Healey was selected as his successor, Feb. 12, 1875. The diocese was large but the church was small and somewhat disorganized. It was his task to bring Bishop Healey to perfect the organization and build up the church.

He was consecrated June 2, 1875, with impressive ceremonies. The 25th anniversary of this consecration was observed here on June 5, 1900, and was made an occasion of religious festivity by the Catholics in Maine. This anniversary was attended by many of the bishops of New England and by hundreds of priests from all parts of New England. Then Bishop Healey appeared to be in good health and his people rejoiced at the thought that he would have many more years to live.

A Young Man Shot and Killed in Catskill.

Catskill, N. Y., Aug. 5—In a barroom adjoining a dancing pavilion here last night, William Hoolford, of New York city, shot and killed William Ryan, 29 years old, of this place. Sheriff Holdridge has under arrest, aside from the murderer, two others, William Prindle, the proprietor of the dancing pavilion, and Milton Brown, the leader of the orchestra.

It is claimed that Ryan was shot in a row which he started himself. Prindle, it is said, before the shooting, hit Ryan on the head with a club and Brown, it is claimed, loaned to Hoolford the revolver with which the shooting was done.

Killed By His Son.

Pineville, Ky., Aug. 5—Daniel Howard, a prominent citizen of this county, was killed today by his son, George Howard, whose life had been threatened by his father while the latter was intoxicated.

Confessed He Poisoned His Father.

Fresno, Cal., Aug. 5—Fred Hines, 13 years old, has confessed that he poisoned his father, who is lying dangerously ill at the county hospital. The boy says that his father treated him cruelly and had refused to allow him to drive his team.

The Scene of the Assassination Ceded for a Chapel.

Rome, Aug. 5—The city council of Monza has ceded the plot of ground, including the spot where King Humbert was assassinated, to the royal family, who will erect a chapel there.

Queen Margherita has composed a tender prayer in memory of her husband and has obtained permission from the archbishop of Cremona to circulate it among the faithful.

King Victor Emmanuel and Queen Helena will arrive in Rome Wednesday. The remains of King Humbert will leave Monza the same day, reaching this city at 9 a. m.

Lawrence, Mass., Aug. 5—The Italian residents of this city held a parade today in memory of King Humbert.
