

# Germany Holds Canada Grip

London, Aug. 16.—(Montreal Gazette Cable)—Private A. T. Jones, of the Forty-third Cameron Highlanders, dropped dead in his tent at Shorncliffe this afternoon. Private Chas. Croucher, of the 28th Battalion, is in the hospital with an injured leg, as a result of being run over by a motor bus.

Private Fred Mayes, of the 26th Battalion, is in the same hospital with several injuries to his head as the result of a fall.

There is no name of Fred Mayes in the available list of the 26th Battalion. It is possible that he was in one of the last drafts of the 55th.
