TOTAL OF \$65,460**

Forty-Seven Permits Issued
During February.

YEAR'S TOTAL \$105,560

**Much Building Activity Is Ex-
pected During Spring
and Summer.**

Final building figures for February today brought the total for the year to \$105,560. There were 47 permits issued during the month for a total of \$65,460, as compared to \$43,535 in February, 1920. The total for 1920 at the end of February was only \$73,210. The principal permit issued today was for the Metropolitan Hotel and Skirt Company to build a store front at 232 Dundas street, to cost \$2,000. With a lead of \$30,000 on the figures of next year, March gives indications of being able to keep up the pace. Last year the building figures totalled \$99,300 during that month.

**LONDON OFFICER ON
EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE
CAVALRY ASSOCIATION**

Lieut.-Col. C. H. Reason, 1st
Hussars, Receives Appoint-
ment on Important Body.

A reorganization of the Cavalry Association of Canada took place in Ottawa on Friday last, when representatives were present from every cavalry unit from Halifax to Vancouver. On Friday evening a reunion banquet was held at the Royal Ottawa Golf Club. General Patterson of Winnipeg, the newly-elected president, in the chair. Among the other members elected to the executive was Lieut.-Col. C. H. Reason, O. C. D. S. O., O. B. E. of the 1st Hussars.

Sir Archibald Macdonell, commanding officer of the Royal Military College, Kingston, was the chief speaker of the occasion. He pointed out the necessity of training recruits so that they would be fitted physically, mentally and morally as Canadian citizens; who would be not merely professional soldiers, but citizens who would play an important part in the destiny of Canada, at the same time being ready to defend the country should occasion arise.

With other speakers, he referred to the splendid record of the cavalry during the late war, both in the early days when they played such an important part in checking the rapid advance of the enemy and later in guarding the Suez Canal and in the Palestine campaign under General Allenby. The individual records of cavalry of the war were discussed, the comment being made that possibly no other branch of the service supplied more officers for higher command, than the cavalry.

During the business part of the meeting, the question of raising horses of the military and hunting type was discussed. It was thought that this industry could be a source of great revenue to farmers, the demand for such horses already exceeding the supply. The cavalry association has interested the departments of militia and agriculture in this industry, which will undoubtedly provide a source of wealth to the country when properly developed.

**25,000 SOVIET TROOPS
ARE OCCUPYING TIFLIS**

Looting in Georgian Capital
by Communists.

Constantinople, Feb. 28.—Bolshevik troops numbering about 25,000 entered Tiflis yesterday evening. It is said in a dispatch received here, for a few hours on Friday there was considerable looting in the city by local communists. It is said, but late in the day the Soviet Government began to restore order. The Italian, German and Turkish missions in Tiflis did not leave when the Georgian Government fled and are still there. The anti-Bolshevik Government proclaimed in Bivran, capital of Armenia, about two weeks ago has been ousted from control, and the Bolsheviks have re-established a Soviet republic. Many members of the anti-Bolshevik region have been imprisoned and the rest are said to be fleeing.

**ROYAL CANADIANS
TROOP THE COLORS**

Impressive Military Ceremony
Conducted at Armories.

GEN. BURSTALL PRESENT

Rev. Canon (Col.) Almond
Gives Stirring Address
to Men.

While lacking much of the pomp and circumstance of the days when the regiments splashed with gold facings added color to the ceremony, the trooping of the King's banner presented to the Royal Canadian Regiment by King Edward in recognition of the regiment's service in South Africa at the Armories this morning was a very impressive affair, added interest being given to the occasion by the fact that it also celebrated the anniversary of Paardeberg Day.

The ceremony was carried out under the command of Col. Claude Hill, D.S.O., commanding officer of the regiment in the presence of Brig.-Gen. H. A. Panel, C.M.G., D.S.O., officer commanding No. 1 Military District, who was accompanied by Lieut.-Ben. Burstall of Ottawa and members of district headquarters staff.

Shortly before 11 o'clock, "C" Company and headquarters, headed by the regimental drum and fife and brass bands, entered the Armories, and the regiment forming up on the south side of the building, facing north, with the bands on the north side facing south, the regimental King's color party taking place in the centre of the line, while the regiment's South African banner, borne by Capt. W. S. Fenton and escorted paraded on the left flank to the front of the regiment.

Immediately on 11 o'clock, the ceremony of trooping the colors began, the ceremony being followed by an inspiring address to the regiment by Rev. Canon (Col.) Almond of Montreal, who was chaplain of the regiment when it went to South Africa.

Col. Almond expressed his great pleasure at being present on an occasion which thrilled with the martial tread of the 18th Brigade, he declared, "I have no doubt that this is the first time since the war that the R. C. R. in South Africa was one of the finest of any regiment of the Empire in any of its wars."

While we celebrate Paardeberg today we no longer think of the occasion as a victory over fellow-colonials. It is a day when we are proud to be as we are. We celebrate rather the splendid record which Africa was proud to hand down from generation to generation.

Referring to the last order issued to the 18th Brigade, of which brigade the Canadians formed a part, by Lord Roberts, commander of the British forces, he said that the fact that the Canadians had marched 600 miles, captured ten towns and secured the Cape, was a record which the Empire could be proud of. He said that the glorious army of Canadian dead in South Africa and the 62,000 on the western front assured that the Empire of the British would be there, ready to give their life blood for the protection and security of the Empire. **SOCIALISTS ASK
THAT WAR DEBTS
BE NATIONALIZED**

A World-Wide Demonstration
For May 1 Discussed.

Vienna, Feb. 28.—Demands that war debts be nationalized, and that countries spared from devastation during the war assume the obligation of aiding these less fortunate, and that peace treaties between the Allies and the central powers be revised, were adopted unanimously by the International Socialist conference in session here yesterday. Other resolutions denounced military adventures, and demanded demobilization of military organizations and the immediate adoption of plans for general disarmament.

Among the motions carried during the day was one urging all Socialist parties to use every means in preventing the outbreak of a new world war, and to bring about a general disarmament. The conference discussed the organization of a world-wide demonstration on May 1 against the peace treaties.

**POISONED DOG CAUSES
EXCITEMENT ON DUNDAS ST.**

People Thought Animal Mad and Scared for Stores.

Agonies of a small black and white hound that had evidently been poisoned caused much excitement and not a little alarm at the corner of Clarence and Dundas streets about 11:30 this morning. The actions of the poor brute as it sought a comfortable spot to lie caused some excited people to jump to the conclusion that it was mad. The word "mad" was no sooner uttered than it spread like wild fire and women, children and not a few men, too, scattered as leaves before a strong wind in their rush for the supposed shelter of the nearest doorway.

So intense was the panic felt by the animal that in its agony it jumped to the hood of an empty sedan car, then into the car and out again, and its wanderings became so erratic that people who were on the sidewalks got the idea that it was chasing them. Inspector Tustin of the local Humane Society was notified, and arrived on the scene a few minutes later took the animal away. The dog was wearing a leather collar and license tag.

New York train, which struck at the other sprang and derailed across the intersection, to make two Michigan Central cars instead of cutting them at right angles.

All the dead were in the two Michigan Central coaches, which carried few through passengers. Upward of fifty persons bound for Quebec, Montreal and Toronto were aboard the eastbound Canadian. Their cars were not much damaged. The New York train was bound for Chicago.

Porter, Ind., Feb. 27.—Twenty-seven persons are known to be dead and more than 100 injured as the result of the wreck of two passenger trains here at 6:20 o'clock last night. New York Central train No. 151, New York and Boston to Chicago, plowed its way through Michigan Central train No. 20, Chicago to Detroit and Toronto, demolishing a wooden day coach and killing or injuring practically every person in it. The scene of the wreck is a lonely junction bordering on the sand dunes and about 50 miles from Chicago. It was two hours before the arrival of the first relief train, and only the efforts of volunteer fire fighters prevented many of the injured from being burned to death.

The accident was caused, according to railway officials, because the Michigan Central train disregarded the stop signals at the intersection of the two roads, and was thrown upon the New York Central tracks.

A statement by Townerman J. S. Coke, on duty at the crossing, declared the block two miles away was set against the Michigan Central train, which left the track clear for the New York Central. Railway officials at the scene of the wreck said Engineer, W. F. Long of Jackson, Mich., who escaped unhurt, declared he had received a clear signal C.
