He and Roy McIntyre were the first to join the colors from Lanark, enlisting in August, 1914, and after a short period of training at Valcartier, sailed for England in October. Since the famous battle of Langemarck, in which the Canadian boys "saved the day," Roy has not been heard from and in consequence was recently reported dead by the militia department.

LETTER FROM THE FRONT.

Mrs. Jas. Thompson has received the following letter from a nephew who has been at the front, and is now in hospital in England:—

Norfolk War Hospital, Norwich, England, Oct. 14th.

My Dear Aunt:—

Am duly in receipt of your welcome letter re-directed from home this morning.

As you already know I am getting along quite nicely and getting a bit tired of hospital life—it's much too quiet. There are a good many Canadians here. I have met some very fine fellows indeed among them. The fighting line is no fun, let me tell you that, and Uncle Jim will in my opinion be very foolish indeed if he joins up at his age. Apart altogether from the fighting a man must be young and very fit to stand the hardships and rough conditions of soldiering in France. I am sorry to say there are very many young men over here still hiding in munition works or some other such bushel. Time enough for the older men after they are all drafted into the army. I keep on telling my father his time will come yet, though I sincerely hope it does not. There is however in my considered opinion every likelihood of this war lasting for a considerable time yet. There is no doubt we will win only the Huns will take some crushing yet. Thank you for photo. It is hard you having to sit in a chair, though you face looks just the same and I darsay you will by now be quite happy in your chair. It does one good to see the men here who have lost arms and legs as happy as the day is long and all their cry is I am alive and that is everything no more France for me, and that is more than everything. There are two in the same ward as me one from Edinburgh and the other from Paisley. I was very lucky indeed getting slightly hit and over to England so quickly, just hope I have the same luck next time out. Am wearying to get home now and expect to get away any day.

NEW GOVERNOR ARRIVES.

Duke of Devonshire Was Sworn in at Halifax.

HALIFAX, N.S., Nov. 13.—The Right Hon. the Duke of Devonshire was formally installed as Governor-General of Canada in the historic council chamber of the Nova Scotia provincial building here at 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon, in the presence of representatives of the Dominion Government, the Senate, the navy, the army, the Supreme Court of Canada, Lieutenant-Governor of Nova Scotia, the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia, the Provincial Cabinet, the clergy of Nova Scotia, and prominent citizens. His Excellency was sworn in by the Hon. Sir Louis Davies, K.M.M.G. The Duke of Devonshire is the third Governor-General to have been installed at Halifax, the others being the Marquis of Lorne and Earl Grey. The ship bearing the Duke of Devonshire, the Duchess of Devonshire, their two daughters, Lady Maud Louisa Emma Cavendish and Lady Blanche Katherine Cavendish, arrived here at noon Sunday.

Shortly before two o'clock Hon. Mr. Blondin, Secretary of State; Mr. Mulvey, Under-Secretary of State; Admiral Kingsmill and staff; Major-General Hodgins, adjutant-general, and his staff, went on board to receive the Duke and the Duchess. In a few minutes they disembarked again accompanied by Captain Buckley-Johnson, King's Royal Rifles, and were followed shortly afterward by his Grace and her Grace and suite. The vice-regal party and suite were taken in automobiles to the Parliament Buildings of the Province of Nova Scotia. The streets from the pier to the Parliament Buildings were lined on both sides with khaki-clad men of overseas troops and force doing garrison duty here. Many thousands of citizens were along the route and the Duke and Duchess were kept busily engaged bowing their acknowledgments to the applauding crowds.

TEUTONS DRIVEN BACK.

Russians and Roumanians Are Now Assuming Big Offensive.

LONDON, Nov. 13.—It was officially announced from Bucharest and Petrograd Sunday that the Russians and the Roumanians have taken the offensive on a wide front in Transylvania, and that they have already won considerable successes in the capture of dominating heights from the enemy.

The offensive was taken by the Roumanians first in the Trotus valley on their north-western front, and in its opening stages they captured Mount Alunius, five miles north of Gologasa, and Mount Preotesele, four and three-quarter miles north of Agas. In the Uzul valley, where they have strengthened their artillery, the big guns destroyed the Uzvolgy factory. Between Slanio and the Teutons launched eight attacks towards the summit of Cernea, but they were repulsed, and the Roumanians assumed the offensive on the whole front between Vrancea and Slanio and they stormed the Lupcel and the Patamoarta summits.

The Russians, who have now come up strong to the assistance of Roumanians, have gained further successes at a point 55 miles south-east of Dorna Watra, and they have penetrated into Eransylvania. This success was won in the region of Tulghes (Tolgyes) Pass, south of Almasmezo, and it comprised the capture of two commanding heights, one machine gun, 200 soldiers, and 205 men. South of Dorna Watra the Teutons continue their attacks on the Russians, but they are not making any success with them. The fighting is severe round the villages of Hollo and Tolgyes.

The southward advance of the Russians and the Roumanians continues with success. Von Mackensen has been unable, so far, to make a stand against the Allies, and they have reached the Topal-Inancseme-Karanasuf line, taking 100 prisoners.

Arrested for Blackmail.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—Charged with attempting a blackmail scheme involving Countess von Bernstorff, wife of the German Ambassador, a man giving his name as Armand Karl Graves was arrested Sunday as he left the residence of Prince von Hatzfeldt-Trachenberg, Counselor of the German Embassy. Graves, who says that at one time he was a German spy, is accused of trying to obtain \$3,000 for a package of letters addressed to Countess von Bernstorff. These letters were smuggled into the United States on October 31st aboard the steamship Oscar II. Graves, according to the officials, represented to Prince von Hatzfeldt that the letters were from a man and were of such an intimate character that they would embarrass Countess von Bernstorff greatly if they fell into the hands of her husband.

King Peter at Athens.

LONDON, Nov. 13.—A Reuter despatch from Athens dated November 11, says:

"It is understood that the Greek Government has agreed to the Entente demands that officials and officers be allowed full liberty to join the Provisional Government, provided they first resign from the royal service."

"King Peter of Serbia has arrived at Athens incognito."

Deny Belgian Reports.

BERLIN, Nov. 13.—According to the Overseas News Agency, authoritative denial is made of statements from Belgian sources that Belgian workmen are being compelled to labor in German factories in which war materials are made.

War Loan Raised.

BERLIN, Nov. 13.—The amount paid on subscription to the fifth German war loan up to November 7, was 8,224,000,000 marks, or 82.8 per cent. of the total.
