

Derbys break even

Streetsville Derbys of the Central Ontario Junior B Hockey League gave their fans their money's worth last Tuesday as they edged Burlington Mohawks 7-6 in a thriller that would have tingled even Alfred Hitchcock's spine.

Burlington took advantage of their host's hospitality in quick fashion as they jumped into a 2-0 lead after only 2:27 minutes of play.

Bob Fukumoto combined with Guy Mortson and Rob Hitchcock to pull the locals within one at the 4:13 mark.

Mohawks regained the two-goal edge and held that advantage until the 19:42 mark when Mortson connected with Fukumoto and Brad Butterworth in on the play.

Mortson's late first-period goal appeared to lift his mates as they exploded for three straight goals in less than two minutes to grab a 5-3 lead.

Mortson started the surge himself as he rifled one home at the 9:10 mark on a solo effort.

Brian Dawes who continues to be a key late acquisition for the Derbys, tallied 31 seconds later with Brad Butterworth setting up the play.

Butterworth shot Streetsville into a two-goal lead with help from Fukumoto and Keith Henry.

Burlington refused to die and made it 5-4 before the period ended.

John Campbell (from Fukumoto and Matt Haggis) and Hitchcock (from Gary Purden) gave what the hosts thought was a comfortable lead.

However, the pesky Mohawks fought back to within one with just over five minutes remaining.

Mohawks went on the warpath and buzzed around the Derby cage for the final minute of play as the visitors pulled their goalie.

Streetsville goaltender John Traicus thwarted Burlington's desperate attempts with the aid of a goalpost with 40 seconds remaining.

Traicus faced 52 drives while his mates unleashed 33 shots at the opposition.

Friday night, the sharp Oakville Blades made it three in a row over Streetsville as they steamrolled to a 6-2 win.

Jim Boyington and Guy Mortson hit for third period masters in saving Derbys from a whitewash.

Gymnasts selected

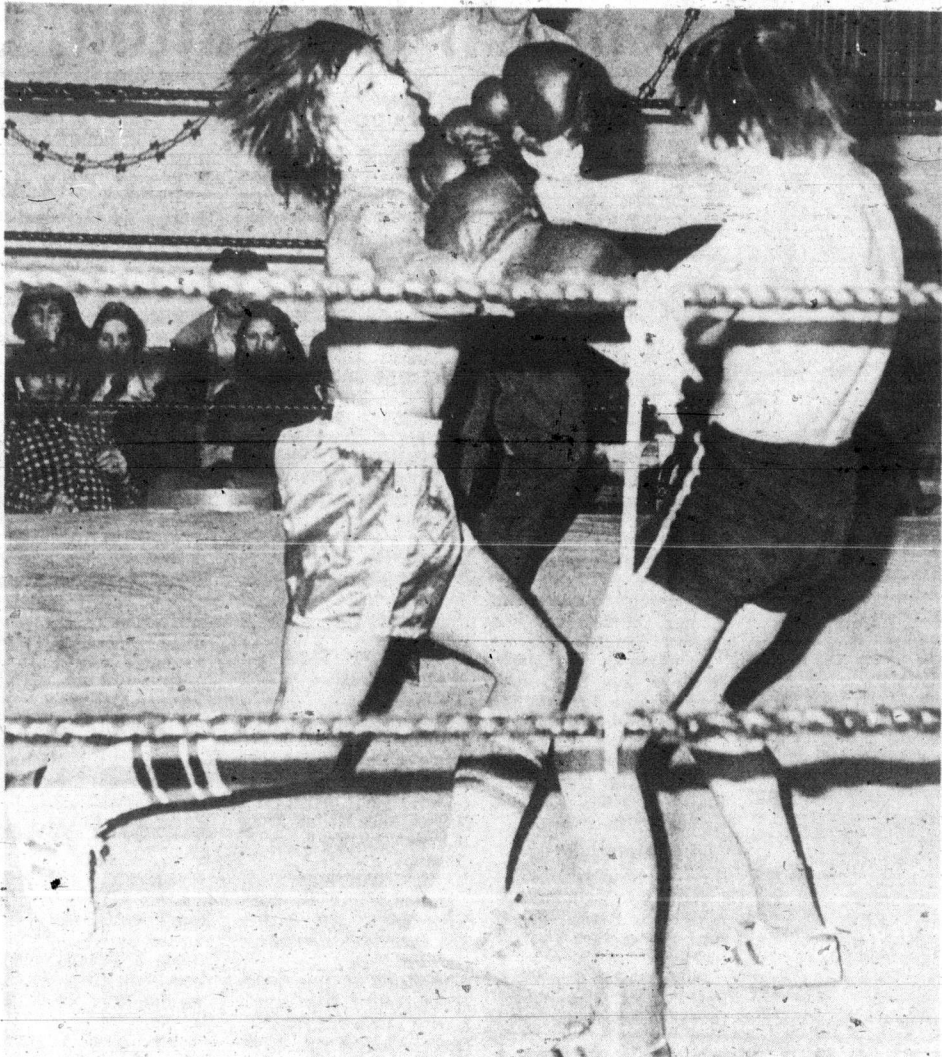
